

OSC President Speaks at Soil Conservation District Meeting

MEHAMA - Dr. A. L. Strand, president of Oregon State college, speaking briefly at the annual meeting of the Santiam Soil conservation district Wednesday night, told of his two months in the Philippines. He stated that distribution of ownership and control of land were "the most important things in the world." The meeting was held at the Santiam Grange hall between Mehama and Lyons.

Chester Loe, fieldman for the First National bank at Salem spoke on the value of conservation, recommending especially the use of grass in the conservation program.

There now are 13,000,000 acres in 35 conservation districts in Oregon, reported Howard Cushman, northwest regional soil conservation secretary. Six new districts were added January 1 to the 29 which had been organized by July, 1949, and additions have been
