

Victoria Threatens Pullout as WI Loop Meet Opens

Western International League baseball directors will have at least one serious problem confronting them when they convene for their 2-day meeting at Tacoma today, for the Victoria Athletics, members of the circuit since 1946, have threatened to give up their franchise if legislation concerning the payment of home and road game receipts isn't forthcoming.

Victoria has for a number of seasons tried to vote in a rule by

which the home clubs in the circuit would keep all gate receipts in all instances. The present method, which is used by the great majority of professional baseball leagues, has the home teams keeping 60 per cent of the net receipts and giving the visiting teams the other 40 per cent.

The Victoria management has contacted all other league directors and President Bob Abel by mail, plainly stating that if the keep-it-all plan isn't adopted during the forthcoming meeting, the Athletics might be forced to with-

draw from the circuit. The letters also stated that the Victoria club has lost a good many thousands of dollars in operating since 1946.

Sensors board of directors member Tom Holman, instructed to vote against the Victoria proposal, will represent Salem at the confab. So will General Manager Hugh Luby, who is flying up from his Oakland, Cal., home and Mike Radan, the new business manager who assumed duties this week here. The Sensors board feels that the Victoria threat is somewhat of a bluff, but will of

course be deeply interested in the proceedings concerning it at Tacoma.

Adoption of the 1951 playing schedule and other odds and ends of business are on Prexy Abel's agenda for the pow-wow, which may be the last before league play opens in April. All clubs will be represented at the meeting, and on Monday of next week the Sensors board will meet with Luby and Radan here for a full report and to adopt policies that will govern the Sensors operation for the coming season.
