Suit Easement Sought in Bill

A person who contributes to an accident through negligence would not be prevented from collecting damages in a court suit under a bill introduced Friday in the house. The bill, introduced by Rep. G. D. Gleason, Portland, states that damages can be collected if the negligence of the person filing suit is not as great as that of the defendant.

Damages should be diminished by the jury, however, in proportion to the negligence of the suing party, according to the bill.

Name Clearance Duty With Clerks

The real estate commissioner has no authority to refuse to renew the license of either of two collection agencies operating in Portland because of the similarity of names, Attorney General George Neuner held Friday.

One is the U. S. Protective service and the other the United States Protective service. Neuner said the only administrative officer, other than the courts, empowered to make a determination as to whether an assumed name resembles a previous one so closely as to cause confusion, is the county clerk.
