New plastic products for the bedroom are handy home products now on the market. An expensive inflatable pillow is one of the newest vinylite developments. You inflate it by means of a rust-resistant valve that seals in the air with a convenient turn-valve. It fits easily into a pillow case when filled with air, but the 21 by 27 inch pillow can be folded into a tiny package for storing. This makes it a good pillow to have for guest accommodations when you use studio or sofa beds for family use and have little storage room.

New covers for pillow and mattresses, also of vinylite, will

keep these things fresh and clean when in use and provide a dust proof cover for them when you want to store them. You can purchase matching bags for storing blankets and quilts. The cases come in twin and full sizes. The vinylite is dirt, moisture and moth proof and can be cleaned with a damp cloth.

An outdoor blanket that can be used for a sleeping porch at home or for camp use out in the open is another new vinylite product. The top of the blanket is made of pliable plastic that will not shrink and will resist moisture, salt water and mildew. It is also non-flammable. The underside of the blanket is soft and warm and the overall effect is a light, warm cover. The size is 44 by 90 inches and the blanket comes in maroon, grey or navy blue. You will find it good for use on a boat deck as well as for other outdoor uses.
