New Gadgets for Kitchen Aimed to Offer Conveniences to Housewife

New gadgets for the kitchen will soon be on the retail market, aimed to offer conveniences to the housewife.

Despite her culinary ability, every housewife needs an efficient can opener and a new one on the market has a built-in magnet to take up the top of the can as it is released, by the knife in the opener. The new style is perpendicular with the handle rotating in front at the top and the can is held at the bottom while it is opened. It comes in red, white and silver and is built to hold the can firmly while the top is removed.

A handy new food press for use in making fruit jams or processing vegetables is another spring product. It is made in aluminum with bakelite handles and holds three and three-quarter quarts of food. The press is worked by a roller that goes back and forth and does the job without the need for peeling or coring the food first.

There's nothing like having a rolling pin which will rinse clean and dry without wiping. A new one of clear lucite plastic is being introduced which can be used to flour the board as well as roll the dough. It also has no moving parts to become clogged with flour or dough. You just hold it under the top when you want to clean it off and it dries by itself.

Another plastic kitchen aid is a cookie press and cake decorator. The dough is placed in a transparent holder and you can have nine different cookie shapes or six decorating designs by simply changing the cover of the container. When not in use the extra covers can be stored within the container.
