Designing Woman

FABRIC AND FURNITURE
What happens when two well known designers get together on a furniture problem, one, a furniture designer and the other, a designer of fabrics? When the one is Harvey Propper, who originated a unique system of designing seating units, and the other is Dorothy Liebes, acknowledged leader in weaving design, the result is a real contribution to contemporary furniture design, furniture and fabric that were made for each other. Mr. Propper uses combinations of squares, rectangles and circles to form the shapes of his pieces and produces them in hundreds of shapes and sizes. This one is composed of two backed centers, and arm and an ottoman, upholstered in a single construction. For it, Mrs. Liebes designed a nubby textured, bright colored fabric that is highlighted by rows of glittering gold tinsel-proof metallic yarn. More for Your Money Collection Steel Household Cabinets Now Available for Storage Purposes

There are comparatively few homemakers who can boast of enough storage space to take care of all the family needs. Apartment dwellers usually have the greatest problem because they do not want to build in cabinets in homes they do not own.

A collection of steel household cabinets now available for storage purposes provides an answer to the problem of where to put items in a small home.

A feature of this collection is a space saving cabinet for the kitchen. The cabinet stands 63 inches high, is 22 inches wide and 12 inches deep. What makes this new type of cabinet so helpful is that it

has been designed with a place for most of the small items used in cooking. The top shelf of the cabinet is planned for linen storage. The two doors open and show spice racks on the inside. Next is a drop-door, ventilated bread box. The third shelf is open for work space or for electrical appliances. The bottom section has shelves for groceries and a divided vegetable and fruit bin which is ventilated.

There is a variety of other cabinets for kitchens with more room. These range in height from table size for rooms where surface space is at a premium to tall cabinets for storing large quantities of groceries.

This manufacturer also makes a group of wardrobe cabinets in a brown finish enamel on metal for use as extra closets or storage of the family clothes over the summer. These have racks inside on which you place the moth balls.

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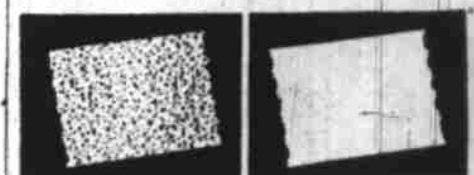
