

Sometimes Old Favorites Turn Up As New Recipes. Are Well Remembered

Every once in a while someone, with a sparkle in the eye and enthusiasm in the voice, tells us about a wonderful new recipe they've tried — which turns out to be a dear old favorite we'd almost forgotten. There are many new recipes of course — but there are thousands of old ones enjoying revivals ever so often.

Only this morning we were reminded of two — one from advance publicity material from Sunset magazine telling about cooking artichokes, and another from a co-worker who suggested an orange pudding-like cake that she had eaten at a party and which recipe she'd been given.

The artichoke deal was to put a clove or two, some garlic, vinegar and a little oil in the water in which artichoke is cooked. We learned that trick from the Italians, and have used it ever since.

Our friends' version is to put a "handful" of mixed pickling spices, a little vinegar, garlic, salt and oil in the water in which artichokes were boiled. The vinegar and garlic and spices give flavor, the oil makes the vegetable shiny. But don't be surprised if you find what looks like well mannered bugs in the artichokes, it's just the spices which have settled between the leaves.

The center of the artichoke, by the way, when choke is removed, makes a good container for crab salad. The leaves are eaten by hand after the salad is eaten.

The orange pudding referred to is one Mother used to make and which we loved. We've run across it now and then as party food and it's deserving of frequent revival.

GERMAN ORANGE CAKE

1 cup sugar 2 cups flour
1/2 cup butter (or margarine) 1 teaspoon soda
1 egg 1 cup ground raisins
1 cup buttermilk Grated rind 1 orange
Cream butter, beat eggs well. Mix ingredients in order given, bake slowly for 40 minutes, (300 degrees) in an 8 x 12 pan. In the meantime, mix up the following:
Juice 1 orange Juice 1/2 lemon
1/4 cup sugar

When cake comes from oven, and while still hot, pour the sauce over it. Some women ice with powdered sugar icing made with orange juice and have a cake with juice layer underneath. Now most people serve the cake as a pudding, with whipped cream on top.

We heard about someone, only last week, who had eaten fresh mushrooms cooked in a "new" way. It's another we got from a friend years ago and have eaten many times. It is, indeed, wonderful.

MUSHROOM CROQUETTES

Select small or medium sized mushrooms, let stand in salted water about an hour. Shake and pat dry in paper towel. Dip in egg and fine crumbs, fry in deep fat for less than five minutes, just enough to brown nicely. They make a main dish if you wish, or may be served as a vegetable on the dinner plate. This way of cooking mushrooms locks in all the delicious juices and makes the mushrooms quite a different food than when fried dry.

It's lots of fun to go through the recipe file and check up on some of the old favorites that have been forgotten, they'll be new to lots of people.
