Farmers Union Juniors Given High Awards

WOODBURN, Feb. 20—Six Junior Farmers Union members were honored at a junior banquet tonight at the three-day Oregon State Farmers Union convention which opened here today.

Torchbearer's awards were presented to Evelyn Boge of Laurel Schools local; to Ronald and Clifford Moeller, Barton Kamna and Joyce Gros of Blooming local, both in Washington county, and to Robert Beutler of Central Howell in Marion county. Presentation was made by H. J. Rolph, national vice president. The award, the highest that can be earned in the organization, represents five years of completed work in the junior organization.

Gale VanLaanen of Central Howell, was master of ceremonies at the banquet. Featured was the pageant, "Peoples of the Earth," adapted and directed by Marjory Brewster, Marion county junior leader. Brooks Junior reserves enacted the pageant.

Difficult for Youth

Jessie Ulic, junior leader, in her report earlier in the day, said it is difficult to interest youth in work because "the youth can't even look forward to the most fundamental opportunity—that to live," she said. However, the youth program had grown this past year, she added.

Ralph Beck, Oregon State college extension service, objected to corrective measures used against inflation as "defeating the independence of the American people. Everyone is hedging when it comes to inflation he said. The urban dollar which is being invested in farm lands creates competition for young farmers just starting out. They should not, he went on, have to compete with "free capital."

Beck also expressed hope that the present "upset" would not bring any shipyards or other "huge war industries" to Oregon. He hoped, instead, that "we would have an opportunity to settle down to meet the needs of the half million people who came to Oregon during the past war." Particularly, he hoped Oregon could catch up with the necessary schools for the influx of population.

Opposes 'Briefing'

Arthur Bone, editor of the Oregon Farmers Union, in his report, expressed bitter opposition to the

so-called "briefing sessions" in which state and defense officials call in correspondents and radio commentators "to give them a few special facts which support the particular line of thinking it is believed desirable the people should follow." Few, he said, were the newspapers and radios whose reporters dug out their own facts. The outcome of these sessions, he added, had been too successful in directing the thought of the American people. He suggested as means of counteracting this provision for more top-level youngsters to obtain college education. Now, he said, only 20 per cent of Oregon high school graduates go to college.

On Wednesday the annual meeting of the insurance delegates will be held. The annual Farmer Union banquet will be held Wednesday night with Dr. A. L. Strand, president of Oregon State college, as speaker. Also to speak during the day will be Vice President Rolph.

More than 200 are expected at Wednesday's meeting, with the peak of the convention, some 300 members, expected on Thursday when the program for 1951 and election of officers will be held.

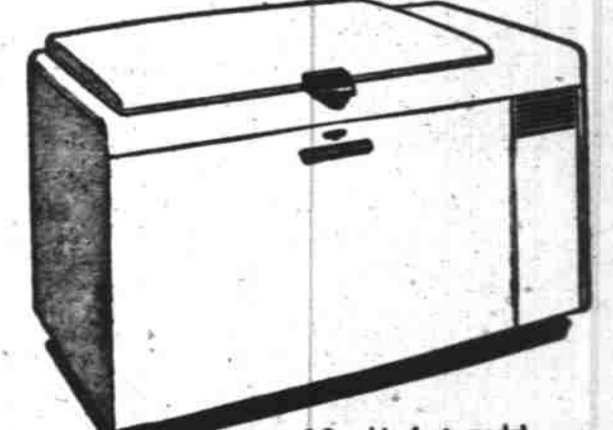

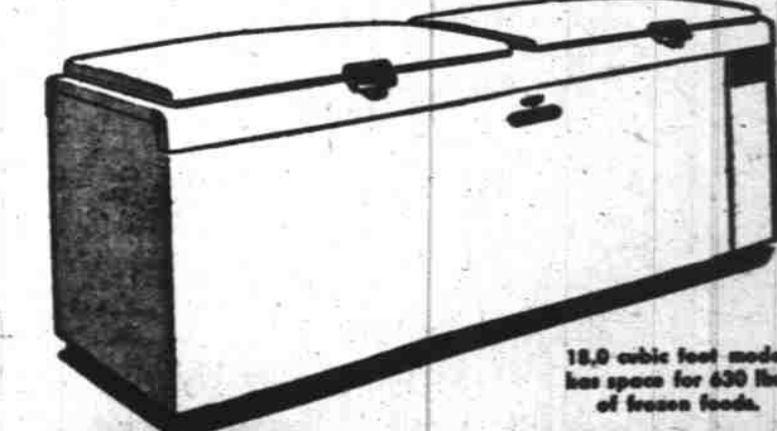
