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PEARL HARBOR, T. H., Feb. 21-(A)-The Norwegian cargo ship Florentine sank last night in a storm about 150 miles southwest of Iwo Jima, the navy said today.

The British steamer Silvermaple picked up the master and 10 crewmen of the 4.896-ton vessel. The name of the master was not mmediately available.

Hampered by rough seas and poor visibility, the Silvermaple and the steamship American Mail were searching for two lifeboats, the navy said.

Information from the air-sea search and rescue headquarters at Guam said 10 men were reported to be in one of the lifeboats and 11 in the other.

(At Seattle, American Mail line headquarters said Capt. J. R. Williamson, skipper of the American Mail, radioed he had rescued 10 Florentine crewmen. This presumably left 11 in one boat still unaccounted for.)

The navy's information did not specify the number of persons aboard the freighter. It was presumed on the basis of reports so far received there were 32.

The Bishops contended they were the real-life counterparts of the novel's "Kettle" family. Johnson said he was the Indian char-acter "Crowbar." All held they were libeled by the portrayals. A superior court jury denied damages to each of the plaintiffs

after two-weeks of testimony. Mrs. MacDonald testified none of the characters in her book depicted any real person.




