

Hoopster Tells of Threats on Life

13th Player Held in 'Fix'

Ex-Blackbird Latest Arrested in Scandal

NEW YORK, March 2 (AP)—A story of threats of gangster-type shooting and downing behind the college basketball fix scandal was revealed today with the 13th player arrested.

Both stories came from Louis Lipman, 29, a star of the Long Island university 1948-49 team.

He was released in \$1,000 bail on a charge of accepting a \$300 bribe for the Madison Square Garden game with Duquesne on Jan. 1, 1949. Duquesne won, 64-55.

Lipman told reporters that prior to that time he got into an argument with one of his teammates on a matter involved "in the scandal now going on."

"I wanted to get rough with one of the fellows," Lipman related, "and he said if I laid a finger on him he knew the right people who would do time on it."

The 13th player arrested today was identified as the former Southern California in a close game at the Garden in the 1948-49 season, Nathan Miller, one of the players now under arrest.

"Lou, if you made one more basket, you'd have gotten us all shot. We told this fellow (presumably the fixer) that you were with us."

In many of the alleged fixes, the idea was not necessarily to lose the game but keep the point margin within a range prescribed by the fixer.

The sixth LIU player to be arrested, Lipman has been living with his wife and two children in Hollywood, Fla., where he is in business. He is an air force veteran of World War II.

He voluntarily accompanied officers back to New York last night.

District Attorney Frank S. Hogan described Lipman as "very important to this investigation" and said "I think he is going to cooperate."

Lipman denied to reporters after this arrangement that he helped fix the Duquesne game, and said he thought the \$300 he received later was a "come-on" or "bonus to get me used to money."

Viks Top Rooks 49-37; SGC Qualifying Starts

Hawks Finish Regular Sched

GILL COLISEUM, Corvallis, March 2 (Special)—Salem's high school Vikings basketball team tonight won a surprising 49-37 victory over the Oregon State Rooks in the preliminary of the Oregon-Oregon State varsity collision.

The win was the Vik's 18th of the campaign against four setbacks and the contest also wound up the Salem team's regular schedule.

Coach Harold Hawk's men got added satisfaction from tonight's upset triumph since the Rooks two weeks ago topped Central Catholic's Rams, No. 1 club in the state in the A.P. poll. The Salems were runnersup in the most recent vote.

A great first half brought the Viking outfit through on the long end of the score tonight. Their fast break working full steam and their shooting eyes at top efficiency, the Salems streaked to a huge 35-15 intermission margin and from then on the Oregon State yearlings never could appreciably close the gap.

The Salems went permanently into the lead three minutes into the ball game when Guard Elmer Haugen potted a field goal to make it 5-4 for the Viks. Two minutes later it was 9-7 for Salem and it was then that the Capital city club uncorked a blistering offensive which gave 'em 11 markers while the Rooks were getting exactly none. That hot surge pushed the prepsters to a 17-7 first-quarter margin and the tail-end of it jumped them to 20-7 a minute into the second half.

The Viks never were seriously threatened after building that whopping advantage.

The count at the end of the third quarter stood 37-25 for Salem.

Forward Bob Hazel topped the Vik scoring with 13. Wayne Walling had 12 and Larry Paulus 11. Ron Fundingsland led the Rooks with 14, eight of them coming on four long baskets in the final quarter.

The Hawks superiority came mainly on their terrific free throw tossing. They hit 23 of 30 tries. The Rooks out-fieldgoal 'em 15-12.

Cougars' Friel Urges Pledges

SEATTLE, March 2 (AP)—Coach Jack Friel suggested today that schools require athletes to sign pledges to report immediately any attempts at bribery.

"We should keep our players thinking at all times of the danger of the 'fix,'" the veteran Washington State college basketball coach told the Puget Sound Sports-writers and Sportscasters association.

Friel and Tippy Dye, University of Washington coach, agreed that players have not always recognized the criminal implications of a bribe offer. Too often the attempts are laughed off by the boys and forgotten until months or years later, when it is impossible to catch the gambler, the coaches said.

Win Needham, Burrell Pacers

Bob Burrell and Win Needham share the medal lead in early qualifying action of the Salem Golf club's annual Spring Handicap tourney. Burrell and Needham, two of the top-ranking swingers of the area, hold the top rung with net 71's.
