Merchants Get Answers on Price Controls

Salem "soft goods" merchants jammed into a Senator hotel room Tuesday morning to get answers on price controls. The meeting was concerned particularly with new federal regulations on price markups for such merchandise.

Robert Greene of the Portland division of the office of price stabilization explained the rules, the worksheets and the charts to nearly 150 persons, at a meeting 50 had been expected to attend.

The crowd kept him occupied with questions, especially with those pertaining to the exceptions and the special cases not covered by the law.

The meeting was arranged by the Chamber of Commerce, Retail Trade bureau and a mayor's committee on price regulations, headed by Arnold Krueger.

State Solons Doubt Budget Cut Possible

Joint ways and means committee members declared here Tuesday there was little possibility of reducing the state's \$180,000,000 budget for the 1951-52 biennium. "I can't see much chance for material cuts in the budget in the face of inflationary conditions," Sen. Dean Walker, chairman of the senate tax committee, said. He urged caution in removing all restrictions on the spending of surplus funds.

"It is always tempting to use surplus funds," Walker averred, "but we must look to the future. Where would we be today if we didn't have the \$30,000,000 surplus carried over from the 1949-51 biennium?"

Sen. Howard Belton, chairman of the senate ways and means committee, agreed with Walker. He urged that the pruning knife be used freely in considering state department budgets.

Walker said the legislature should know the overall financial picture of the state before making radical changes in the current tax structure.

Senate Votes to Permit Inter-Race Marriages

Oregon's 85-year-old ban on inter-racial marriages would be removed under a bill passed by the senate, 21 to 7, and sent to the house Tuesday.

The present law prohibits marriages between white persons and Negroes, Indians, Chinese or Hawaiians and provides jail sentences and fines for violations. The law actually seldom has been used.

Sen. Philip Hitchcock, sponsor of the repealer, called the present law a "disgrace to the state, violating fundamental concepts of the constitution of the United States and of the law of God."

Sen. Eugene Marsh, McMinnville, however, called the bill "unfair to the children who are the offspring of parents of mixed marriages."

"They are outcasts," Marsh claimed.

Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland, claimed Hitchcock's bill would "set civil rights back 20 years."

"This is the kind of legislation Negroes do not want," Mahoney said.

Sen. Warren Gill, Lebanon, co-sponsor of the bill, told senators, "I don't expect any rush for the county clerk's office. I can't say I favor such marriages but I don't disfavor them. It's a personal right."

Sen. Elmo Smith, John Day, claimed legislation was not the way to solve social problems "controlled by emotion and prejudice."

Regarding the claim that the bill was a crime against unborn children, Hitchcock said, "How far can the state go in fixing happy homes? Are you going to prevent Catholic from marrying Protestants? Moslems from marrying Jews?"
