Hop Marketing Hearing Ends

PORTLAND, March 21 -(AP)- A hearing on proposed changes in hop marketing rules ended today after three days of testimony by growers and market specialists.

Testimony in the closing day was mostly on minor issues among the 15 proposed amendments to the hop marketing agreement. In the previous two days there had the previous two days there had been testimony on two controversial issues: Whether to give the hop control board more control over surplus hops, and whether to change the growers' privilege of diverting surplus hops.

CORVALLIS, March 21 -(P)-Cows registered with Oregon's Dairy Herd Improvement association showed an all-time high in average milk and butterfat production for 1950.

Production last year averaged 8,108 pounds of milk including 380 pounds of butterfat for the 17,237 cows in 19 counties where DHIA work is under way.


