Canyon Group Plans Chamber Of Commerce

STAYTON—Organization of a canyon chamber of commerce was initiated recently when 18 representatives of the five communities met in the Mill City fire hall. Stayton, Mehama, Lyons, Elkhorn, Mill City, Gates, Detroit and Idanha are to be included, according to tentative plans. Gene Teague of Stayton was elected temporary chairman.

A committee on constitution and by-laws met Wednesday and will make its report at a meeting in the Santiam Grange hall at Mehama March 23.

Projects mentioned for early consideration include a complete survey of resources in the area, including industrial possibilities and available sites and publication of a booklet based on the survey. Petitioning for a block of power to be generated at Detroit is another project.

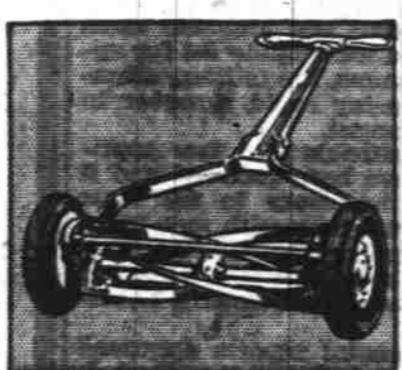
