Let's Solve Your

Money Problems

If you pay as many as five bills each month, you will do well to have a checking account at a bank. For the independent, financially well established household or individual, the checking account is practically indispensable. If you haven't yet opened an account, don't be too bothered with the problem of selecting a bank. You can hardly go wrong in taking a friend's recommendation, or in dealing with folks that you know. Generally speaking, the bank most conveniently located is a good bet. A checking account will give you a certain amount of prestige. The account will amount to an excellent beginning if you ever want to ask for a loan. Moreover, having the account will make it possible for you to enjoy the many and various services offered by the bank to its customers. Inquire at your bank for any available pamphlet describing the services you might be interested in.

Discuss your financial problems with your banker—not with the teller in the cage—but with one of those men at the desks on the front or side as you go in. They are there to serve you. For your checking account to be of the utmost value to you, however, there are a number of facts that are helpful to know. For example, your bank or anyone else can endorse your salary check for deposit to your account. Only you can write checks on it, unless you have made a different specific arrangement with your bank. Never write a check in pencil. Too easy for someone to alter it. Remember too that a simple signature is hardest to forge with success. Always fill in the blank space on your check and on the check stub before you tear the check out. The numbering is for your convenience in matching cancelled checks with stubs. Match them and balance your book regularly. If you don't know how, or if you have trouble in keeping your book correctly balanced, ask your banker for his suggestions. He has seen the problem before, and he will be glad to help you. If you are cashing or depositing a check that someone has made

out to you—if your name is not spelled right, endorse the check as it is made out, and then under this write your name as you ordinarily sign it. As you endorse, it is often well to consider whether you ought to use a blank endorsement—where you merely sign your name; or a restrictive endorsement—where you first write "for deposit only"; or a special endorsement—where you first write "pay to the order of Mr. So-and-so." As a general rule don't use a blank endorsement if a restrictive or special endorsement will do. Note that a post-dated check will be treated by the bank as an overdraft, if the post-dating is noticed. If the amount written on the check does not correspond with the amount expressed in figures, the bank will either not honor the check or rely upon the amount written out.

Think long and hard a dozen times before you endorse a check for accommodation of someone you would not trust with your pocketbook. If you have any doubt at all, have the moral courage to do your duty by yourself and your dependents. Decline to endorse. Say you make it a general practice not to. And if these observations and warnings on endorsing checks are in order, they will be even more in order when you come to endorsing someone's note to a bank. Better think a hundred times and not do it.

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Worshippers Prepare for Easter Rites

By The Associated Press. The traditional holy week of mourning ended last night. Christians of many lands prepared to celebrate the Easter miracle of Jesus Christ's resurrection in a world now beset by anxiety and fear.

Worshippers thronged churches of the old world and the new for Good Friday devotions on the anniversary of the crucifixion. Thousands of Europeans and many Americans made the Good Friday pilgrimage along the winding Via Dolorosa in old walled Jerusalem, where Christ carried his cross to Calvary.

In a medieval Roman Catholic service last night at the Basilica of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem, a symbolic figure was taken from a cross, bathed, anointed and laid in a tomb. For the first time in three decades, a Christian religious service was held in the Cenaculum on Mt. Zion, scene of the Last Supper.

About 8,000 pilgrims and tourists gathered in Rome for the Easter holidays and the spiritual exercises ending Holy Week.

Peace Rumor Drops Grains

CHICAGO, March 24 (AP)—Grains and soybeans slumped today on liquidation prompted by General MacArthur's offer to discuss peace with the Korean Reds.

There were conflicting interests in the wheat pit, due to the continued poor growing weather in the southwest. This led to some buying in the deferred futures.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1 cent lower, the previous finish, corn off 1/4 to 1/2, oats down 1/4 to 1/2, rye 1/4 to 1/2 lower, soybeans unchanged to 4 cents lower, and lard 23 to 45 cents a hundred pounds lower.

Forester Andrews Killed in Wreck

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—Horace Justin Andrews, 50, regional forester in charge of the Oregon Division, Forest Service, was killed today in an automobile crash in a nearby suburb.

Andrews was a passenger in an automobile that collided with a truck on the Pacific Highway in Clatsop county. The car driver, Charles Tebbe, 46, Chevy Chase, Md., was hospitalized for shock and possible concussion.

Andrews, who was in Washington for a two-week meeting of regional foresters, had been a gunner at Pacific Army Airfield. Andrews joined the forest service at Portland in 1930, became assistant regional forester in 1939, and regional forester in 1943.
