Recital by WU Faculty Members

A sonata recital featuring Dr. Willis C. Gates, violinist, and Stanley Butler, pianist, will be presented by the Willamette university College of Music Monday at 8:15 o'clock in Waller hall.

Dr. Gates was appointed to his present position as associate professor of music at Willamette in 1949. He taught at Livingston State Teachers college, Livingston, Ala., and the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, N. C., before coming here.

The violinist attended Penn State college and received a B.M. from the Peabody Conservatory of Music, Baltimore, M. A. from Johns Hopkins university, Baltimore, and a Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, N. C.

Butler, assistant professor of music, is new to the Willamette faculty this year. He formerly taught at the Longy School of Music in Cambridge, Mass., Western Reserve university, and Cleveland college, Cleveland, Ohio. He received his education at Michigan State college where he attended on a four year scholarship. He also studied at Harvard university.

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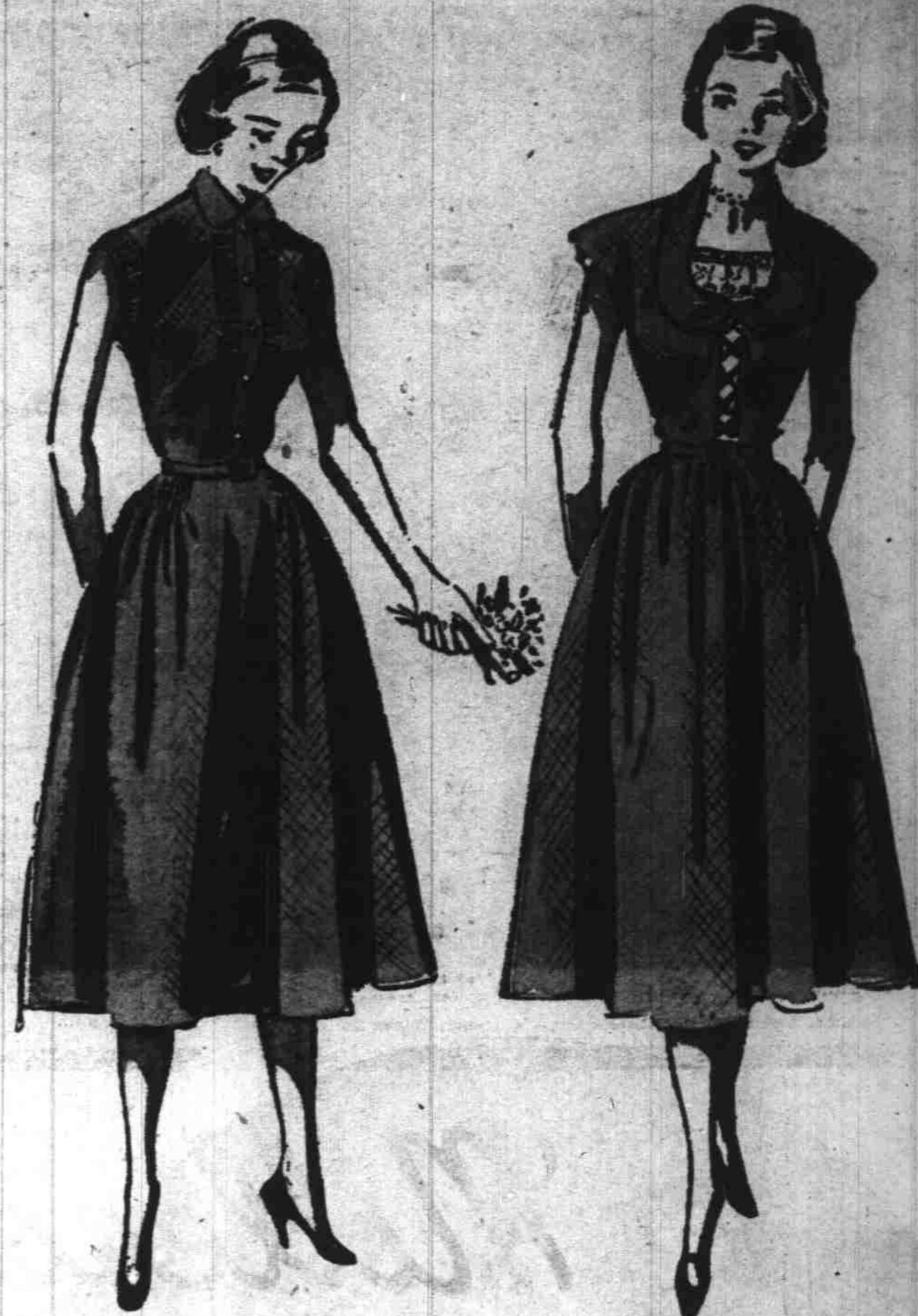
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
