STAYTON, April 20—Preparation for Marion county's annual spring 4-H show got underway here today at the community hall. Booths were being prepared and the hall readied for the large display which will open here Monday morning at 9 o'clock. All health posters are to be entered in the 4-H office at Salem before noon Saturday.

Most of Monday will be devoted to entering and setting up exhibits at the community hall. All exhibits must be in the hall by 4 p.m. Monday. At 9 o'clock Monday morning the healthiest boy and girl contest will be held at the Women's club house here with the Marion county public health department in charge.

Judging of exhibits starts at the community hall at 9 a.m. Tuesday. There will be demonstrations and special contests during the day and exhibits will be open to the public from 5 to 10 p.m. Tuesday.

Judging and demonstrations will be continued again on Wednesday and Thursday morning. The annual style revue judging has been set for 1 p.m. with the style revue itself at 8 p.m. Thursday night at the Stayton grade school gymnasium at 850 First street.

At 9 a.m. Friday, judging contests for clothing, cooking and homemaking will start. The annual 4-H parade will be held Friday at 12:15, with formation at the community hall and the parade to go through the downtown Stayton streets to the grade school gymnasium.

At 2 o'clock Friday afternoon, a program including the presentation of special awards and group singing will be held, followed at 3 o'clock by the release of all exhibits with the exception of the blue ribbon health posters.

## Jersey Queen Must Be Girl With Beauty

Women as well as cows must have pulchritude if they are to reign in Oregon Jersey events. This decision was reached Thursday at the April meeting of the Oregon Jersey Cattle club directors at Senator hotel.

Marlin Fox, Molalla, presided at the luncheon meeting, with Jens Svith, Grants Pass, here as secretary.

Fox explained that a Jersey queen is chosen each year during Spring Show Jubilee week, which opens this year May 15 in Washington county. This queen reigns at the annual state picnic in August as well as at state fair events and the Pacific International Livestock Jersey show.

Last year the queen was chosen on 75 per cent dairy ability and 25 per cent beauty. The directors voted to reverse this and give 75 per cent on "appearance and personality" and 25 per cent on dairy ability. Judges of the spring shows will also make the final queen decision. Each county club will present a candidate and these must be between the ages of nine and 19 years. Another stipulation is that she must be the daughter of a Jersey club member or of a 4-H club with a Jersey project.

Marion county Jersey Cattle club will be host to the state club on August 5 at the annual summer picnic. Champogee park was chosen as the place and Fred Davis, Woodburn, president of the Marion club, will select his committee to head the arrangements. Announcement was made that J. F. Cavanaugh, assistant secretary of the American Jersey Cattle club, will attend this picnic. He comes west from national headquarters at Columbus, Ohio.

The directors voted to hold its second Helfer Investment sale in Malheur county and a state consignment sale, dates to be arranged by a committee selected by President Fox.
