NEW YORK, April 20 (AP)—Ralls held the stock market down today as Wall Street took a two-hour recess to give General MacArthur the biggest ticker tape welcome ever accorded a returning hero.

Trading was done in two sessions from 10 to 11 a. m. and from 1 to 3 p. m. (EST). Most security and commodity markets suspended or curtailed activities during the MacArthur celebration.

Railroads started weakening in the first hour. They continued on the depressed side in the final two hours, although individual recoveries were made from the day's low point.

CHICAGO, April 20 (AP)—Grains drifted through another session of minor ups and downs today, ending with an indecisive mixture of gains and losses.

Wheat closed 3/4 lower to 1/2 higher, corn 3/4 lower, oats 1 1/2 lower to 3/4 higher, rye (old style) 1/4 lower to 3/4 higher, soybeans 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher and lard 2 cents lower to 8 cents a hundred pounds higher.
