

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE NORTH SIXTEENTH STREET FROM ROOSEVELT STREET TO SOUTH LINE CONDIT'S ADDITION

NOTICE HEREBY IS GIVEN that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it necessary and expedient and hereby declares its purpose and intention to improve North Sixteenth Street from the north line of Roosevelt Street to the south line of Condit's Addition in the City of Salem, Marion County, Oregon, at the expense of the shunting and adjacent property, except the street intersections the expense of which will be assumed by the City of Salem, by bringing said portion of said street to the established grade, constructing cement concrete curbs, and paving said portion of said street with a 2 1/2" asphaltic concrete pavement 30 feet in width, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor which were adopted by the Common Council April 9, 1951, which are now on file in the office of the city recorder and which by this reference thereto are made a part hereof. The Common Council hereby declares its purpose and intention to make the above described improvement by and through the street improvement department.

Written remonstrance against the above proposed improvement may be filed with the city recorder at any time within ten days after the final publication of this notice by the owners of the property affected.

Salem Bank Loans Jump 25 Per Cent

Bank loans in Salem are up 25 per cent over a year ago, figures from Salem's four banks showed this week end.

Loans aggregated \$21,087,245 in this month's compilation, compared with \$16,886,562 on the April 24, 1950, call date.

Deposits also were higher, with the local banks showing a total of \$64,689,969 or about 3 per cent above last year's figures as of the comparable period last year.

Willamette Valley bank and the two local branches of U. S. National Bank of Portland (combined for the report) showed their figures as set forth in the April 9 official call date this year, while Salem branch of First National of Portland, released figures as of March 31. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks remained unchanged today at \$93.10, just 80 cents under a week ago.

Buying Flurry Boosts Grains

CHICAGO, April 21—(AP)—A brief buying flurry at the start provided gains with their only show of strength on the board of trade today. After the first 15 minutes the board settled down to a routine trade, during which much of the early gains were lost.

Wheat closed 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher, corn 3/8 to 1 cent lower, oats 1/2 lower to 3/8 higher, rye (old style) 1/4 to 1 cent lower, soybeans 1/2 lower to 1/2 higher and lard 2 cents lower to 7 cents a hundred pounds higher.
