Bossing Opens Teachers Meet At Monmouth

Stateman News Service MONMOUTH, April 29 — Dr. Nelson L. Bossing, University of Minnesota professor of education, opened an educators' conference here Saturday by attacking educators who "give lip service to modern and democratic ideas in the classroom but who do little to advance those ideas."

Dr. Bossing spoke at the Oregon college conference on education held at the Oregon College of Education here. More than 600 Oregon educators attended the meet.

Dr. Stewart B. Hamblen, field consultant in applied economics of the Sloan foundation in New York, told the group that a nation's standard of living is geared directly to the quality of its schools.

At the afternoon session Adolph A. Sandin, professor of education at the University of Oregon, spoke on the ingredients of good elementary schools. Mrs. Natalie Cole of Los Angeles, author of the book "Arts in the Classroom," talked on creative arts for children.

Other speakers included Frank Bennett, superintendent of Salem schools, who led a session for administrators, and Mathilda Gilles, principal of Richmond school, both of Salem.

Later Dr. Hamblen spoke at the annual banquet for Phi Delta Kappa, Pi Lambda Theta and Delta Kappa Gamma fraternities Saturday night. Dr. C. A. Howard, president of Phi Delta Kappa, and president emeritus of OCE, presided.

Plan Gardens With Space in Mind, 4-H Told

City boys and girls planning 4-H gardens in small areas should omit crops requiring worlds of room.

This is a vegetable garden tip from R. Ralph Clark, Oregon State college extension horticulture specialist. Clark says sweet corn, for example, gives a low food yield per unit of land occupied. Sprawling plants like cucumbers and vining varieties of squash also take up too much room, unless they are trained on a fence or trellis.

Climbing beans and lima beans, on the other hand, give large yields per land unit taken up. Staked tomatoes yield more per unit if planted relatively close, and greens are a good choice be-

cause of their "cut and come again" habits.

Salem youth were urged to grow vegetable gardens this year where good soil and water are available. This is in line with the governor's state-wide emphasis on more home-grown food for better family living this year. The city of Salem 4-H club program is co-operating in this effort, according to James Bishop, city 4-H extension agent.

Any Salem boy or girl wanting to grow a garden as a 4-H project may obtain information from the club office in the public school office building.
