### Tacoma Takes 17-5, 8-3 Wins

Pitching Fails; Club **Ends 1st Home Stand** 

By Al Lightner Considerably better mudders than our men, Tacoma's Tigers Sunday cuffed the town Senators twice in hail and rain-pelted and wind-rocked Waters field, 17 to 5 and 8 to 3. It was a nasty lump for the Salems to absorb in closing out their first home stand of the season, and especially so after the hours of labor spent during

the Sunday morning hours by
Hugh Luby & Co. in attempting
to get the field dry enough to
play on.

As things turned out there's no need stressing how much Luby now wishes it had rained. But those kind of games do come along to plague even the big leaguers

now and then.

The first game, played in a blustery, cold wind and on an infield that forbade its half-frozen tormentors to take more than one or two steps in any direction be-cause of the slippery muck, was anything but tasteful both from the standpoint of how the score turned out and how the athletes had to cut down their efficiency. It seemed to bother the Tigers much less than the resident crew, and when they were through they had banged out 19 hits, picked up eight bases on balls, three wild pitches and four Salem errors for

their whopping total.

Victim of the first portion of the parade was Bill Bevans. He couldn't get loosened up, had two bad innings and left after five heats with the count 7-2 against him. Big Bill threw nothing like he did in blanking Victoria the previous Tuesday night and his control was just as faulty.

Bevens' first two successors, Sal DeGeorge and Jack Hemphill fared little better. DeGeorge worked one inning and yielded two runs. Hemphill was tagged for eight in a little more than two stanzas, and Johnny Lopeman, the righthander in on a look from the Philadelphia Phillies had to come through rather admirably to retire the side in the ene-my's five-run ninth inning. Of all the hits the Tiges col-lected, some of them mighty scratchy because of the sloppy infield and high wind, only one


