For the latter numbers, Josephine Albert Spaulding and Corydon Bloodger will be soloists. A silver offering will be taken.

On Thursday night the Salem branch, Oregon Music Teachers association will sponsor a program by Robert Hord, assistant professor of music at University of Oregon, in Waller hall at 8:15 o'clock.

Mr. Hord is known as a concert pianist of brilliance and artistry. The public is invited to attend.
