### Votes Reveal Demo Strategy On Farm Issues

WASHINGTON, May 20 (AP)—Nine roll-call votes on two big appropriation bills have tipped off the strategy democrats will use in an attempt to oust incumbent house republicans in farm states in 1952.

The roll calls came on amendments cutting appropriations for the interior and agriculture departments.

They showed that a majority of republicans voted for the cuts, and that a majority of democrats opposed them.

In each instance the roll-call votes were demanded by democrats.

"We want to make the record in black and white so we can refer to it in the 1952 congressional elections," a top democratic political strategist told newsmen.

"We need an official record to answer republican claims that they are not responsible for what the 82nd congress, with a democratic majority, did to the farmers and to the rural projects for their electricity."

Democrats recall that in the 1948 campaign Senator Alben W. Barkley campaigned throughout the west and midwest and stressed cuts in farm appropriations made by the republican-controlled 80th congress.

Whether it was due solely to Barkley's campaigning or not, the republicans lost a lot of house seats from "farm belt" districts that year and President Truman was re-elected over the odds-on GOP favorite Gov. Thomas E. Dewey.

A study of the 1948 election results shows that the republican losses in the house were heavy in the farm states of the midwest and west.

"Those people want economy just like everyone else does," the democrats' spokesman said. "But, like most other people, they don't want economy drives aimed right smack at them. We are not going to let the people forget how the republicans from those districts voted."

Ministers participating were Dr. Victor H. Sword, president of the Salem council, the Rev. Brooks Moore, the Rev. Louis White, and the Rev. Dudley Strain.

Dr. Giersbach, who is a former president of the Oregon Council of Churches, emphasized the need for the unifying force of United Christian action.

Teeter-Totter Mark Broken In California

BERKELEY, Calif., May 20 (AP)—Gary Kaveny, a slim University of California sophomore, climbed stiffly off his see-saw in the wee hours today after 53 hours 54 minutes of ups and downs—a world record, he claims.

The time topped by one hour 49 minutes the teeter-totter record set last week by two University of Washington students—Bob Brackenbach, 22, and Dick Priest, 20.

Various fraternity brothers manned the other end of the board with Kaveny. The stunt was staged at the annual university circus.

The 19-year-old Colusa, Calif., student had to teeter and totter at least once every 15 seconds. He was allowed five minutes off the board during each hour.

"I'd never do it again—not even for money," commented Kaveny as he rushed off to bed.

Later Kaveny was asked about complaints from backers of Brackenbach and Priest. They said the California see-sawer wasn't exactly being fair in claiming the record.

He had two mates while Brackenbach and Priest went all the way together; Kaveny had a mattress on the board so he could nap while his mate did all the work.

To all questions, Kaveny only snored.

### Amateur Yeggs Batter Safe at Parrish High

Amateur yeggs battered a safe at Parrish junior high school with a sledge hammer but failed to crack it open early Sunday.

Police said the burglars left the 16-pound sledge at the scene bludgeoning a cast-iron door off the 3,000-pound cement-and-steel safe.

The prowlers entered by smashing the glass from a rear door of the schoolhouse, then smashing another pane from the door of the principal's office where the safe is located.

Detectives doubted that professional crooks were involved. The attempt to smash the safe apparently had been abandoned when the culprits were confronted by steel sheeting after shattering the iron door. The heavy safe had been tipped on one side.

The break-in was discovered Sunday morning by a school-teacher, according to police, who said several checks were reported missing from the principal's office.

A break-in at Highland school also was discovered at 10:30 a. m. Sunday, but the safe there had not been tampered with and nothing was reported missing, police said. "Brute force" apparently was used to push open a door on the northside of Highland schoolhouse, an investigating officer reported.

### Soviet Claims Fluid Cures Skin Cancer

MOSCOW, May 20 (AP)—The magazine Ogonek said today a Soviet scientist had discovered a fluid which cures skin cancers completely with one treatment.

The fluid, the nature of which was not disclosed, was discovered by Dr. Vyacheslav Gordeev of Stanislav, in the western Ukraine, Ogonek said, and already has ended the sufferings of thousands of patients.

(In Chicago, a spokesman for the American Medical association said he is "inclined to doubt that it's anything new.")

(The spokesman said skin cancers have been treated successfully in this country with zinc chloride. He said this treatment has been perfected by a physician connected with the University of Iowa.)

The article claimed that the fluid also cures skin ulcers of various sorts and ulcerous and warty tuberculosis of the skin. Ogonek continued:

"The scale of effectiveness of Gordeev's liquids almost unlimited—from cancer of the skin to blackheads, simple warts and the traceless removal of tattooing." The magazine did not say how the liquids prepared or what it contains.
