Stone recently arrived in Ore-gon to replace Horace J. Andrews, who was killed in March in an auto accident. Previously he was for five years regional forester for an 11-state area with headquarters

in Atlanta, Ga.

He pointed out that the Oregon-Washington area is much smaller than his former region but that its 23,000,000 acres of national forest are 21/2 times as great.

He entered the postal service as a clerk at the Sheridan postoffice in August, 1942, and was appointed postmaster in October, 1946, after returning from
