First Work Clinic Draws 25 Persons

First of a series of conferences for people not customarily employed and wanting to gain, or regain, a place in the labor market was held Friday morning in the county courthouse.

About 25 persons answered the call for the 10 a.m. meeting issued by Bill Baillie, manager of the Salem employment office, to explain how those interested can get in a gainful job. Others are planned for the future.

All types of work are on the lists of the employment office for qualified men and women or those who are willing to train for the jobs, he said, looking at the prospective labor shortage as a continuing need for the next one to six years.

Future Farmer Stock Show Slated Today

Approximately 65 head of Future Farmer livestock including 40 head of sheep and lambs, 15 dairy cattle and 10 beef cattle will be on exhibit on the lot just north of the Sears-Roebuck Salem store on Capitol street today, according to Ralph L. Morgan, state supervisor of agricultural education. The exhibit consists of registered breeding stock purchased with Sears-Roebuck foundation funds to improve supervised farming programs of boys enrolled in high school vocational agriculture classes in Oregon.

Cash prizes and ribbons will be awarded the various classes by the Sears-Roebuck foundation. A total of 75 chapters in Oregon are co-operating in the overall program, but for this show exhibits will be largely from the Willamette valley.

Harley Meuret of Madras, who will bring his registered Shorthorns to the show, is the exhibitor from the greatest distance.

Dick Richards, assistant manager of the Oregon state fair, will be the official judge for beef and sheep. Leonard Hudson, agricultural instructor from Silverton, will assist with the dairy cattle.

The cooperative program of raising purebred livestock began in 1942, and 294 Oregon boys have received registered animals since its inception. Animals are awarded to individual FFA boys only after a careful study by chapter committees. Each boy who is awarded an animal is placed under contract.

Widely known throughout the northwest, Dr. McCall is credited by R. S. Besse, associate director of the Oregon agricultural experiment station, with making a great contribution to Oregon agriculture, particularly in the development of the state's cereal crop production.

Power Sales Increase for Private Firms

Electricity sales by private power companies in Oregon are increasing rapidly, Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg reported Friday.

He said their March sales to commercial customers increased 18 per cent over March, 1950, while residential consumption was up 11.1 per cent.

In that period, the commercial rates dropped 8.8 per cent, while residential power costs were down 2.53 per cent.

Flagg said the average cost per kilowatt hour for residential use in March was 1.347 cents, or less than half the national average. Residential and rural customers use three times as much electricity as the national average.

Marketing Begins On Turkey Hens

CORVALLIS—Turkey hens are going to the market now, that the egg-laying season is completed. That, says Noel Bennion, Oregon State college poultry specialist, is a new item for the budget maker.

Approximately 232,000 turkey breeder hens will be included in the slaughter-number.

The extension poultry specialist adds that these breeder hens are still less than a year old.

Habeas Corpus Writ Granted Ted Macomber

Writ of habeas corpus, with hearing Monday at 10 a.m., was granted Friday in Marion county circuit court to Ted Macomber, serving a 40-year penitentiary sentence on an habitual criminal conviction.

Macomber's petition, prepared by Willamette university's legal aid clinic, holds that the prisoner is detained illegally because he once was granted his release on a writ of habeas corpus.

Macomber was sentenced Oct. 23, 1939, shortly after being sentenced on his third felony conviction, a grand larceny count.

Several years later Circuit Judge George R. Duncan held the sentence was void, ruling that the habitual criminal information should have been filed prior to the third sentence, rather than serving merely to lengthen that sentence.

On May 20, 1947, the state supreme court reversed Duncan's decision, and Macomber was ordered returned to prison on the court's mandate.

The petition holds that the prison ward had no right to appeal from the circuit court, because the law under which he did conflicts with the constitution which prohibits suspension of the writ of
