Michigan, which won two of the Big Ten's five victories in the expired five-year pact would be ineligible to compete until the 1953 bowl game under the new agree-

On the Pacific Coast conference side of the fence, however, there was some question as to whether that conference would start the rule that California which appeared in the last three bowl games would be ineligible for the 1952 bowl game.
