

Joint Chiefs Misleading Probers, Cain Charges

WASHINGTON, June 8—(AP)—Senator Cain (R-Wash) charged today that senators have been "misled" by the joint chiefs of staff into believing Gen. Douglas MacArthur first suggested quitting Korea last December. He demanded their recall for further testimony.

Cain told the MacArthur inquiry group that new information on a message from the joint chiefs to MacArthur last Dec. 29 was "very startling" and called for an explanation.

He said the joint chiefs gave a paraphrase of this message, he said, "was largely misleading. Whether this was an intentional act, I have no present way of knowing."

"... on the face of the original paraphrase, somebody deliberately sought to establish as being true that the field commander (MacArthur) was initiating consideration of evacuating Korea."

The joint chiefs and their chairman, Gen. Omar N. Bradley, all have said the possibility of evacuation was first raised by MacArthur early in December.

Chairman Russell (D-Ga) of the inquiry group agreed with Cain "there seems to be some marked differences" in paraphrases of the Dec. 29 message.

But a majority of the committee was not present at the time Cain made his demand and Russell said the matter could not be put to a vote. Cain said he would bring it up later.

The question of whether MacArthur or the joint chiefs first raised the prospect of an evacuation in Korea has been in dispute throughout the hearing.

The testimony shows that early in December Army Chief of Staff J. Lawton Collins—then in Tokyo reported to Washington that MacArthur believed it would be best for the U.N. to "arrange an armistice on the best terms available as soon as possible."

And later Collins reported MacArthur had discussed evacuation with his army commanders.

This new development came as Secretary of State Acheson was winding up his seventh day of testimony on the MacArthur ouster and U. S. Far East policy. He will be questioned again tomorrow (9 a.m. EST) in the 31st day of the hearing.

Missing New Mexico Tots Found Alive

SANTA FE, June 8—(AP)—Three small children were found tired, hungry and thirsty but otherwise unharmed tonight, after 28 lonely hours in the rugged Sangre de Cristo mountains.

On hearing the news, their parents trudged the jagged, steep mountains with lanterns and flashlights last night, the three—Larry McGee, 7, his sister Janet, 5, and Steven Cross, 3½—slept in a hollow log.

"I took good care of them," Larry boasted. "Once I heard some one yelling, but I didn't answer because I thought they were big gorillas."

"Gee, I'm hungry. When I get home I am going to eat and eat." State Police Chief Joe Roach radioed that none of the three suffered any ill effects from the 45-degree night temperature. They were clad only in thin T-shirts and blue jeans on wandering away yesterday from a family picnic.

The youngsters first were sighted in jagged Box canyon—about 3½ miles from the spot where they disappeared—by three airmen from Kiriland base at Albuquerque.

First radio report of their being found came from Tom Gardner, Santa Fe radio repairman. "They're all all right," he reported. "Not scared or crying. But they sure are hungry, tired and thirsty."

He was hospitalized at both the Emanuel and Veterans hospital, being released just this month. At first he will only be working five hours a day.

NW Projects Hit by House Budget Cuts

WASHINGTON, June 8—(AP)—The decision of the house appropriations committee to recommend against starting any new projects ran heavily against the Pacific northwest today.

In its report to the house, the committee recommended cuts totaling \$125,877,443 in the army's request for money to carry out its rivers and harbors and flood control program during the 12 months beginning July 1.

Of that total reduction \$42,711,000—more than a third—came from projects in Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

Of \$130,000,000 requested for the three states the committee bill retained only \$87,292,000. In cutting funds for Lookout Point Reservoir, Ore., from \$16,633,000 to \$15,000,000, the committee said it was eliminating \$1,300,000 asked to start construction on Dexter re-regulating dam.

The Dexter dam is a new project, authorized separately from the Lookout Point reservoir, the report said.

Only two northwest projects came through the committee unscathed. The full \$17,392,000 asked for Chief Joseph dam on the Columbia river and a \$100,000 request to continue bank protection work on the Willamette river in Oregon were approved.

Funds requested for three other projects were pared without comment by the committee. It recommended approval of only \$36,000,000 of the \$42,900,000 asked to continue construction of McNary lock and dam; \$15,000,000 instead of \$16,978,000 for Detroit reservoir in Oregon; and \$3,800,000 instead of \$4,000,000 for Luck Peak reservoir in Idaho.
