WASHINGTON, June 8-(R)-Senator Cain (R-Wash) charged to-flay that senators have been "misled" by the joint chiefs of staff into believing Gen. Douglas MacArthur first suggested quitting Korea last December. He demanded their recall for further testimony.

planation.

best for the U.N. to "arrange an armistice on the best terms available as soon as possible."

And later Collins reported MacArthur had discussed evacuation

with his army commanders. This new development came as Secretary of State Acheson was winding up his seventh day of testimony on the MacArthur ouster and U. S. Far East policy. He will be questioned again tomorrow (9 a.m. EST) in the 31st day of the hearing.




