For many years there was little change in these differentials, but with the large increases, made entirely on a percentage basis, of the past few years, this spread has been tre-

The governor said that in 1946, it cost \$315.80 more to send a carload of canned goods from Port-land to New York than it did from Oconomowoc, Wis., a competing

Now, he said, the differential has increased to \$611.82, and the proposed rate boosts would increase the difference to \$703.59.

"Taxes on transportation and communications penalize the west," he continued. "Since all such taxes are on a percentage basis, the long haul bears an unfair part of the burden."

The proposed freight raise would be 15 per cent.
