Water Supply Assured by Land Trade

"Abundant water" is assured for Salem, this week's city council resolution said regarding a trade whereby the city gives to Oregon Pulp and Paper 9.88 acres on Minto's island in exchange for 60 second feet of water on the North Santiam.

Minto's island is in the Willamette just west of the paper company plant. The North Santiam is the present source of Salem's water supply.

The city acquired the Minto island tract when it purchased the water company from Oregon-Washington Water service 16 years ago. It began drawing on the North Santiam for water, instead of the Willamette, three years later.

A emergency service is provided by the resolution passed this week. For Six years and thereafter, until the paper company gives notice of cancellation the city will be able to draw 25 second feet of water from the mill race in case the main supply is cut off.
