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# State Income Tax Collections Rise Sharply

Income tax collections in April ed Wednesday.

Officials said that while there was a material increase in income tax collections for the months of April and May this year, there were indications of a leveling off controls and other government restrictions which would tend to reduce state income tax collections. Officials agreed with a recent

statement by Governor Douglas McKay in a Klamath Falls address that ample funds are available to cover the state's financial demands for the biennium beginning July 1. They emphasized, however, that in coping with the 1951-53 biennium the last legislature permitted the use of \$32,-000,000 of surplus state funds. They also said they agreed with Governor McKay that the 1953 legislature would face a financial deficit ranging from \$45,000,000

to \$60,000,000. Governor McKay denied here Wednesday reports he had opposed the three-cents-a-package cigaret tax in a recent address.

"I neither opposed nor support-Permit Filed

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



The new enlistment program will continue until July 15, said Sergeant Gilley, but no information has been received concerning an has been received concerning an extension of the deadline date.




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
