Meet to Stress Church-town Cooperation

CORVALLIS — Cultivating church and community cooperation will be featured through six panel discussions at the 1951 Leadership institute for town and country churches at Oregon State college July 19 to 23, according to Dr. E. W. Warrington, professor of religion and philosophy at OSC and institute co-chairman.

Panel discussions will center on church architecture, landscaping of the rural church, religious leadership, farm organization cooperation, improving church and community youth programs, school cooperation and contributions of various church community relationships.

The institute is intended for all lay as well as ministerial leaders interested in raising the spiritual life of Oregon's rural communities.

Rev. Martin Eldbo of North Richland, Wash., representative of the Home Missions Council of North America, and Rev. George Murphy of John Day, representing the archdiocese of Portland in Oregon, have been scheduled as the main speakers.

The institute, sponsored jointly by three church and four farm groups and OSC, will feature a series of tours, including the OSC agricultural experiment station farms, home management houses, nursery school and research projects, and student religious centers.

The local volunteer fire department will put on a fire fighting demonstration and a water fight between the two companies at 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

The days will be concluded with a Church Day on Sunday. An effort is being made to have all Keizer residents attend a worship service at 11 a.m. in one of the community churches. A mass youth rally is scheduled for 4:30 p.m. and the day will close with a community-wide service in the school auditorium at 7:30. Herb Anderson, former director of the Salem Youth Center, will speak at the closing service and music will be presented by the community orchestra and the combined choirs of the Community Faith Lutheran and Nazarene churches.

St. Paul Books Hollywood Child Star for July Rodeo

ST. PAUL—Hollywood's "Little Beaver"—known to rodeo audiences as Little Brown Jug Reynolds—will be the featured guest entertainer at the St. Paul rodeo, July 1-2-3-4, Association Secretary Gene Smith announces.

The youngster who really knows how to ride and rope has played to nationwide audiences. He will put his matched Palominos through Roman riding, obstacle jumping—with two horses; and trick roping acts. It has been several years since this child star has appeared in the Pacific northwest.

Jack Wilson, also of Hollywood, will be this year's rodeo clown and bull fighter. Patty Hall, Wenatchee, Wash., horseback acrobat, will perform her skills of hopping, drome stands, Russian drags, and loop-the-loops atop her speeding mount during each of the four rodeo performances.

For a few minutes each show, roping and riding will give way to a pair of balance artists—the Montynes—natives of Mexico, who are known from coast to coast on the nightclub circuit. The Montynes will perform their hand stands on built-up blocks and unsupported vertical ladders on a portable stage in the arena.

A Centralia, Wash., native, Pete Logan, who has traveled the national rodeo circuit as an ace announcer will call the plays on this year's show at St. Paul. He has announced Madison Square Gardens, Boston Gardens, San Francisco Cow Palace and Houston, Texas, wild west shows.
