

Spring Lamb is Summertime Meat
Special Emphasis on Outdoor Recipes

Lamb is always a good summertime meat, and not mentioning any names, we'd say it's especially practical for this summer. This loaf you can serve either hot or cold, which makes it a good outdoor or indoor dish.

LAMB LOAF

1 egg
1 lb. ground lamb
1 cup fresh crumbs
3 tablespoons grated onion
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 cup chopped green pepper
1/4 cup tomato juice
Finish of poultry seasoning
1 teaspoon pepper

Beat egg, combine other ingredients and mix well. Bake in lightly greased ring or loaf tin at 350 degrees for about one hour or until done. Unmold and serve hot with rice or cold with potato salad or potato chips.

JELLIED LAMB LOAF

1 package lemon gelatin
2 cups hot water
1 cup finely sliced cooked lamb
4 tablespoons green pepper
1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire

Dissolve gelatin in hot water, chill until syrupy, add other ingredients (olives sliced thin) and pour into molds or one loaf pan. Chill. Serve on lettuce, garnishing with mayonnaise. As soon as the fresh dill heads develop in the garden try this recipe using the herb. Or, of course, you can buy dried dill like any spice.

LAMB, SWEDISH STYLE

Summer neck or shoulder of lamb in water, salted and seasoned with dill (3 stalks to a quart of water) and done. Remove meat, cut into pieces for individual servings and serve with dill sauce.

DILL SAUCE

1 tablespoon butter or margarine
2 tablespoons flour
2 cups hot beef stock
1 1/2 tablespoons vinegar
2 teaspoons sugar
Salt to taste
1 egg
2 tablespoons chopped dill pickle

Melt shortening, blend in flour, gradually add hot stock from lamb, stirring to keep smooth. Remove from heat, add seasonings, beaten egg and stir to blend. Add pickle and serve immediately.
