Crowds of newsmen greeted the Tongay's plane today.

Then the immigration men step-ped in, whisking the Tongays off to a private office. Reporters were barred during the next half hour while officials questioned the par-ents on their plans for the chil-

After the discussion with Tongay, the immigration officials phoned their head office for in-

door heard an official tell Tongay: "We have some bad news for you. After examining your case it has been decided by the home office that you can not stay." Tongay began to argue, but was waved away.
