Ambulance Damaged on Way to Crash

A Salem ambulance was involved in a collision Thursday morning while on the way to pick up the victim of another accident, city police reported.

The ambulance, rounding into Wallace road from the end of the Willamette bridge, collided with a car driven by Fred Albert Ross, 2465 N. Commercial st. Police charged Ross with failure to yield the right of way to an emergency vehicle.

The ambulance was on the way to bring Mrs. Axel Jacobsen, 1760 Norway st., from the scene of an accident on the Wallace road near Glen Creek drive. She was taken to Salem General hospital for undetermined back injuries.

Damage to the ambulance, owned City Ambulance service, was estimated by driver Don Stewart at about \$50.

Missouri Flood Toll Mounts; Rain Forecast

KANSAS CITY, June 28—(P)—The muddy Missouri and its tributaries covered more than 300,000 acres across the state tonight and in Kansas critical floods swirled down five rivers.

Missouri waters have claimed two lives. The gloomy forecast for both states was more downpours tonight and tomorrow.

The Missouri flood area extended from Kansas City to St. Charles, near St. Louis.

In Sedalia, the 25,000 population was without drinking water after a seven-inch rain. Officials turned off the water supply when an overflow from Flat creek endangered a reservoir and prevented purification.

Two boys died in floodwaters, one at Mokane on the Missouri and the other near Chillicothe on the Grand river.

In Kansas, Manhattan braced itself for its worst flood of the year — and it's been having some corks. Water already covered about 20 blocks in the east and new flood crests were rolling toward there on the Smoky Hill and Big Blue rivers.

Texan in Burma Shames Texas

Tumble From Cherry Tree Fatal to Edgar

Eighty-five-year-old James W. Edgar, Salem route 1, died Thursday as a result of injuries incurred Monday in a fall from a cherry tree.

His neck and spine were fractured in the fall. He had been helping a neighbor, Glenn Run-corn, pick cherries.

Mr. Edgar was a lifelong resident of the Salem area. He was born in Oregon City but spent most of his life in fruit and grain farming on Wallace road property near Salem.

He had retired from farming but remained in good health until the Monday accident. He died in a local hospital yesterday.

Surviving are the widow, Edna; two daughters, Mrs. Coral Mooney and Mrs. Beryl Eakins, both of Portland, a son, Kenneth Edgar, Salem; two sisters, Mrs. Ida Mae Williamson, Salem, and Mrs. Marion T. Lance, Portland; a granddaughter, Dorothy Joanne McFarlane; seven other grandchildren, two great grandchildren, several nieces and a nephew.

Red Terrorist Deaths Mount

SINGAPORE—(P)—The British war against communist terrorism in the Malayan jungle had its best month in April when 107 terrorists were killed, highest of any month since start of the emergency here in June, 1948.

A government review of operations also said that 19 Communists surrendered, also a high mark for the past 12 months; 55 were wounded and five suspects captured. Sixty-two food dumps were found. During the month the army lost 23 men killed and the police 42 killed. Civilians' totals were not given for April but it was announced that the number of civilians slain since the start of the emergency has reached 1,492 with 887 wounded and 385 missing. Of that total 68 dead and 42 wounded were Europeans.

Job Opening In Singapore

SINGAPORE—(P)—The University of Malaya is making inquiries all over the world, including Hong Kong and the United States, for a professor of Chinese Studies to head its newly created Department of Chinese Studies.

Dr. G. V. Allen, vice chancellor, said "a well known man with a reputation as a Chinese scholar—a man with profound knowledge of Chinese language and literature," is required.

Money Said Behind Reds

SINGAPORE—(P)—The "Straits Times" claims an organization backed by plenty of money and believed to include a number of Singapore businessmen is operating in this British colony as a supply agency for communist terrorists in Malaya.

The newspaper said these supplies include opium, tobacco, tinned food and drugs. It added that thousands of dollars are spent by the "organization" in evading the customs patrols and in landing supplies at certain points along the west coast of Johore state. The "Times" said police are expected to make a large number of arrests soon in Malaya.

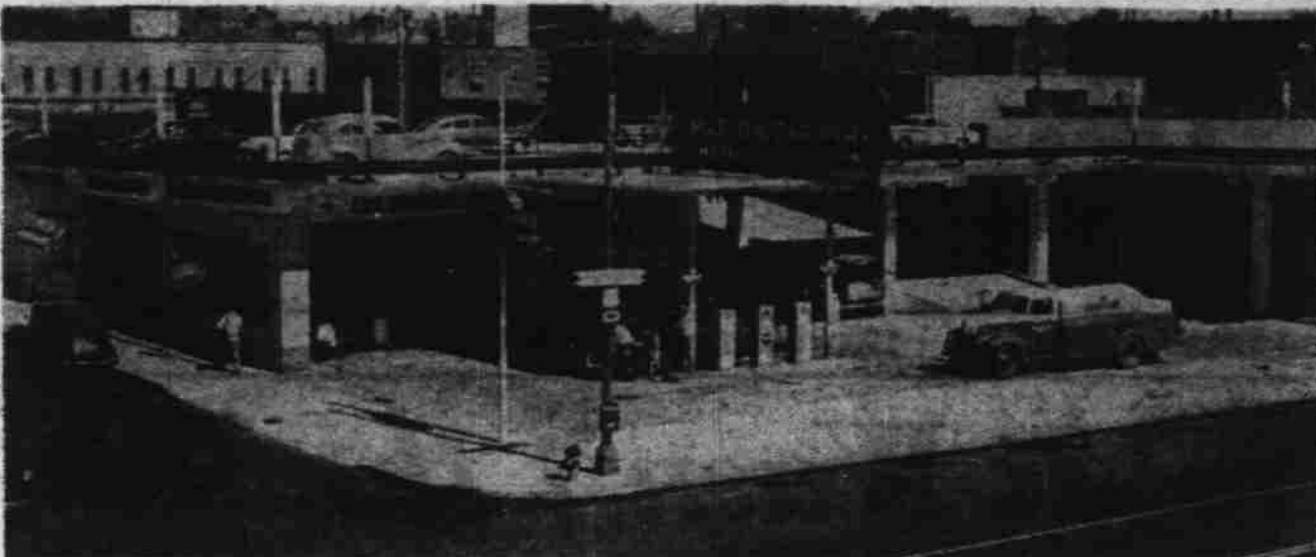
BENNY, FLYNN GREETED

Shelton Gang Feud Claims Another Victim

FAIRFIELD, Ill., June 28—(P)—A farmer was killed and two other persons were machine-gunned and seriously wounded here today in a violent flare-up of the old Shelton gang feud dating back to prohibition days.

The dead man was identified by Police Chief Otis Hallam as Louis Sons, about 56. His body, a bullet wound in the head, was found in a resort about a mile out of town, approximately three hours after the machine-gunning in the west end of Fairfield.

Hallam said the resort was owned by Ogie Pennington, brother of one of the machinegun victims.

The police chief added that he is working on the theory that Sons may have witnessed the earlier downtown shooting.

Victims in that affair were Guy Pennington, 37, and his wife, Lulu Shelton Pennington, 44, youngest sister of the notorious Shelton brothers who terrorized southern Illinois in the 1920s.

Three of the brothers have been slain from ambush since 1947. The two surviving brothers quietly slipped out of this country last January after several attempts had been made on their lives.

Mexican Boys' Town Planned

McALLEN, Tex.—(P)—The people of the Lower Rio Grande valley are going to help Mexico establish a Ciudad de los Ninos—a Boys' Town patterned after the famed boys' home in Nebraska.

Father Carlos Alvarez—"Mexico's Father Flanagan"—launched his campaign for a Mexican Boys' Town after seeing the movie "Boys' Town." The Mexican counterpart will be in Villa Guadalupe, on the outskirts of Monterrey.

President Miguel Aleman's wife laid the cornerstone for the first building recently. So far about 6,000,000 pesos have been raised. Two million more are needed.

Consolidation Plan Defeated

A proposed consolidation of Waconda and Mission Bottom school districts was defeated Thursday night unofficial returns of balloting in those districts revealed.

Mission Bottom defeated the proposal 26 to 9 while Waconda approved it 9 to 2. Mission Bottom approved a 1951-52 budget by a vote of 31 to 1.

Hubbard school district, at an election Thursday night, approved its 1951-52 budget by an unanimous ballot.

Water Supply Short in Salem Heights Area

SALEM HEIGHTS, June 28—Nearly 100 homes in this suburban area south of Salem were without water tonight, following heavy water use on the hottest day of the year.

Irrigation will be limited to alternate days, as a result, was decreed by the water district commissioners after a check of the shortage. They said the water-less residences were along Browning avenue and higher elevations in the district. So much water was flowing throughout the district that pressure was too low to reach those houses.

Water Commissioner Myron Butler said the new restriction directs sprinkling only on odd numbered days at residences with odd house or box numbers and irrigation only on even numbered days at even numbered houses.

The district will continue its ban on irrigation daily between noon and 7 p.m. This was ordered at the outset of the irrigation season when the city of Salem announced that it could sell the district no more water than it used last year. But Salem Heights water district now serves 90 more homes than it did last year.

Rock Particles Enter Salem's Water System

Fine particles washed out from the rock crushing plant at Detroit dam are getting into Salem's water supply, but the problem is not dangerous and is nearing a solution.

That was the word from City Manager J. L. Franzen Thursday night after he returned from a conference with construction officials at the damsite. He was accompanied by two city department heads, Water Manager Carl Guenther and Attorney Chris Kowitz.

The finely ground rock particles enter the North Santiam river in the "wash water" from the rock crushing operation at various times. This foreign matter must be settled out, as it is too fine for filtering, the city officials said.

No health hazard is involved as the water continues to test pure as distributed by the Salem city water system, Franzen said.

The city manager said he would confer further today with officials of Consolidated Builders, Inc., dam contractors. He said the contractors appeared cooperative and he felt the water problem could be cleared up promptly.
