ALBANY — The Rev. Charles Ernest Cole, 75, former vicar of St. Peter's Episcopal church in Albany, died at his home in Gaston, July 5. Funeral services under the direction of the Fortmiller-Fredrickson directors, will be held from St. Peter's church here at 2 p. m., Monday. The Right Rev. Benjamin Dagwell, bishop of Oregon, will officiate, assisted by the Rev. E. James Kingsley, present vicar of St. Peter's. Burial will be in the Albany Masonic cemetery.

Charles Cole was born May 8, 1876, in Redruth, Cornwall, England. He came to the United States in 1912. He was a graduate of Kentucky State university, receiving his P.H.D. degree in 1936. He served the Albany church as vicar from 1937 till 1939. During World War I, the Rev. Mr. Cole was a chaplain in the army. He had been a resident of Oregon since 1931. He was a member of the Knights Templar, the Scottish Rite Masons, and a life-long member of the Lions club.

Survivors include the widow and the following children: Mrs. G. W. Tewksbury of Waiialulu Plantation, Waiialulu, Oahu, Hawaii; Mrs. A. L. Griffiths of Kirkland, Wash.; and Mrs. Charles E. Perry of Canton, N. Y., and a stepson, Loren A. Sim of Los Angeles.

STAYTON — The city council recently took two actions to advance preparations for building the street over the hill to the site of the Santiam Memorial hospital.

Pipe was purchased from the H. D. Fowler company of Seattle. It is 1700 feet in length and has a four-inch diameter. It is steel, wrapped with asbestos and treated, inside and out. Included in the

\$2,024.54 billing were two fire hydrants at \$108 each.

Also authorized was the laying of about 250 feet of 12-inch culvert parallel with the street which will permit leveling off with adjacent land.
