New Move on Daylight Plan Filed in Court

Appeal was filed in the state supreme court Thursday by the Oregon state grange and Oregon Farmers Union in their suit to compel Gov. Douglas McKay to rescind his proclamation declaring daylight saving time in Oregon.

Circuit Judge George Duncan, Marion county, held in favor of the governor and dismissed the action.

In a similar suit filed in April, the supreme court refused to assume jurisdiction.

Plaintiffs' attorney, Raymond Kell, of Portland, charged that the proclamation was premature because all states bordering on Oregon had not issued a similar proclamation at the time Governor McKay acted.

A former general George Neuner previously ruled that Oregon could proclaim fast time when any one of the bordering states had done so.

Daylight saving time became operative in Oregon April 29. The Oregon state grange is now sponsoring an initiative measure to keep the state on Standard time.

Hearing of arguments in the latest suit may not be heard until September when the supreme court members return from their summer vacation.
