They were among the veterans being returned on rotation aboard the U. S. S. General J. C. Breckinridge. Swenson is in the army, Koker in the air force.

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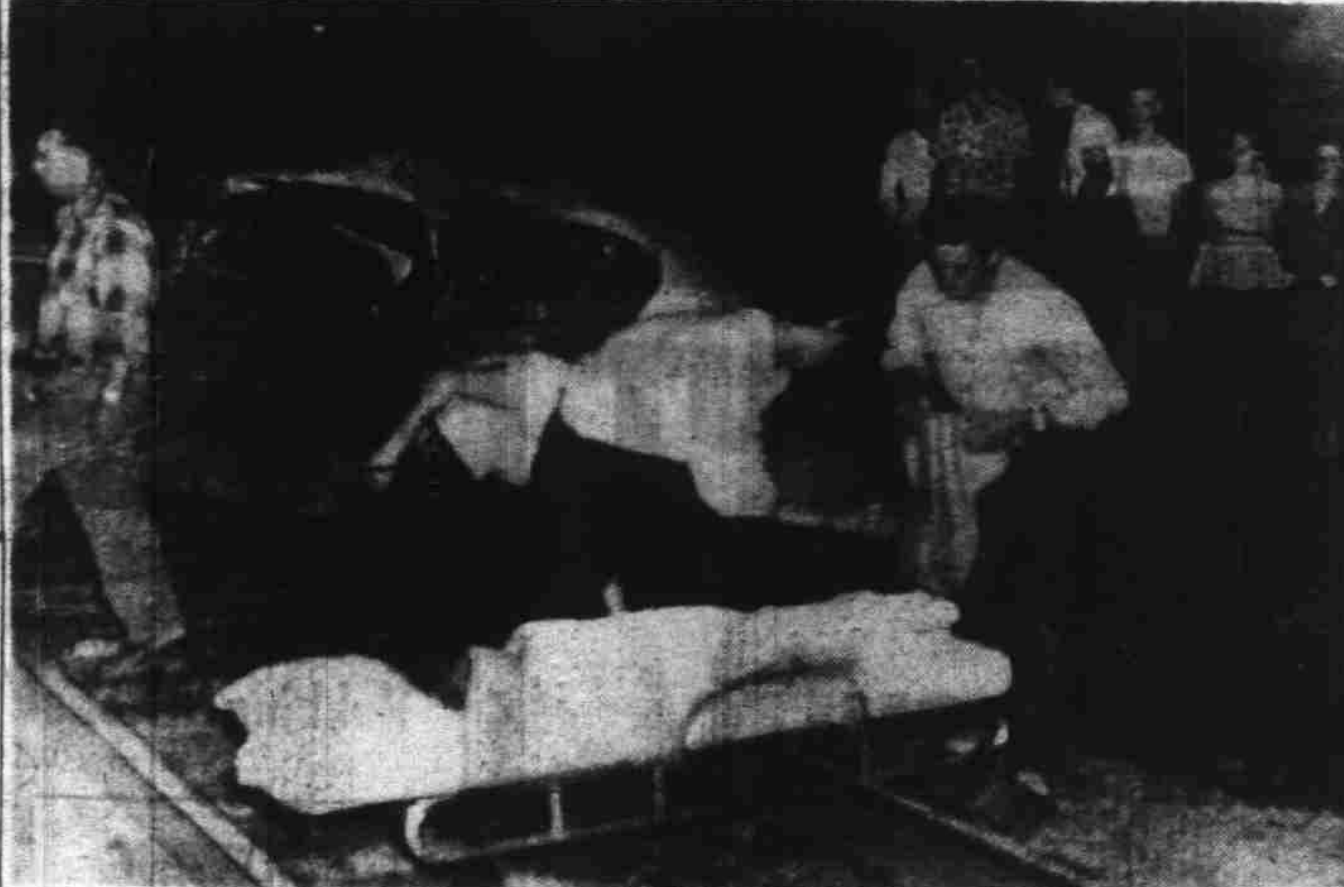
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Where One Died and Three Were Injured

15 Second-string Communists Free, Bail Restored; Judge Reverses Decision of Court

NEW YORK, July 12—(AP)—Judge Learned Hand today freed 15 second string communist leaders from jail, reinstating the bail posted for them by the Civil Rights congress.

It was a stunning blow to the government, even though the 15 did not gain freedom at once.

Only yesterday, Federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan put the reds back behind bars by revoking the bail and outlawing the congress as a bondman in the future.

U. S. Attorney Irving H. Saypol called Judge Hand's reversal of Judge Ryan "an outrageous thing."

But Judge Hand shut him up in a hurry, snapping curtly: "My order is what I say. If Judge Ryan chooses to ignore it, that's something else. I have made my order. I don't care to hear any more."

Judge Hand recently retired as federal appeals judge. At 79, he is one of the nation's best-known and most highly respected judges.

As a retired judge, he is on call when needed to sit on cases. He was sitting today on another matter, when an attorney for the 15 jailed reds came before him. At first Judge Hand brushed him off. But he finally agreed to review Judge Ryan's ruling.

After reinstating the bonds, Judge Hand directed that the whole bail question be reviewed again before Judge Ryan tomorrow.

Hand based his decision on an earlier ruling by the full three-man court of appeals that Civil

Rights congress bail was acceptable for 11 top-level U. S. communist party leaders.

The congress has been branded communist and subversive by the attorney general's office. It is the chief source of bail in any case where communism is an issue.

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Salem Dusting Pilot Killed In Wyoming

LUSK, Wyo., July 12—(AP)—Milt S. Baker, 41, Salem, Ore., was fatally injured today when the plane from which he was spraying grasshopper poison crashed about 20 miles north of Lusk.

Baker, flying a converted bomber training ship for the Ace Flying Service of Salem, apparently was off course.

The ship struck a power line pole, sheared off a wing and plunged to the ground. It was virtually demolished. Baker died a few minutes later. He had resided in Salem for 16 years.

Baker is survived by his wife, Mrs. Florence Baker, 3175 Fisher rd., Salem; an eight-year-old son, Steven Lee; two brothers, Dr. P. D. Baker, Salem, and John T. Baker, Fort Wayne, Ind.; four sisters, Mrs. Stanley Yates, Sheldon, Wash.; Mrs. Dean Hoyt, McCook, Neb.; Mrs. Melvin Wight, Bartley, Neb.; and Mrs. Otto Hehnkey, Scotts Bluff, Neb.
