Fine New Carpets and Rugs Woven of Blend of Wool and Rayon. Economical

 Fine new carpets and rugs woven entirely of a blend of wool and new carpet rayon, will soon be offered on the retail market. The new blend will make quality carpets available at a price lower than that of comparable wool carpeting, and will be available in a variety of textures and colors. Felix Stadel, stylist for the line, has found that textures are the first consideration of modern home-makers shopping for carpeting. "We have styled the collection to fit into ranch houses and city apartments, with either modern or traditional furniture, or with the popular trend combining both," Stadel explained. One of the new textures is a luxury type carpet with a shaggy pile almost an inch in length. It comes in many popular colors



including a new white wine. Another deep-pile floor covering has a pattern of fine line drawing giving a two-pile effect. A moderately priced damask pattern has a smooth texture, achieved by using cut and twist yarn. Another budget number is a fine new twist broadloom. New rugs in the collection come in 20 sizes. A modern ranch type pattern is a geometric motif with soft flowing lines. A bloom and leaf design in autumn colors is more conservative. For English period homes there is a country garden floral with roses growing on a brick wall background. A new twist rug, comparable to the twist carpeting mentioned above, is available in grey, beige, rose, opera red and palmetto and sherwood green.
