They are not on any schedule, they say. Neither it seems, are their prospective hosts, for who can plan for tomorrow when company may arrive tonight.

Such a situation taxes the tempers of a childless host or hostess, but it takes the skilled efforts of two lion tamers to keep a brood of youngsters in a treading-water mood for an indefinite period of time. And clean enough to be proud of if company ever does come.

If the guests-to-be are old friends or close relatives perhaps the situation can be handled more simply. Merely don't go away from the house anywhere from one day to a month, without leaving someone behind to relay the news of the arrival of guests.
