

Evangelist Aide To Speak Here 3 p.m. Sunday

An outdoor rally Sunday in Salem will present Bill Surber, former newspaper editor who just became associate evangelist with Jim Mercer. It will be sponsored by Salem Christian Business Men's committee at 3 p.m. in Marion square.

The meeting is another in the series preparing for Mercer's evangelistic tent meetings here August 14-September 3, under sponsorship of Greater Salem Gospel crusade.

Surber was announced as formerly an avid disbeliever in the Bible and popular as an athletic commentator and writer. He was converted while listening to Mercer in Shelbyville, Tenn., where he was editor of the Times-Gazette.

He resigned last week to give full-time to Christian service and arrived Sunday in Vancouver, Wash., where Mercer is conducting a revival.

Music and testimonies at the rally will be under the direction of Jerry Brown, president of the committee.

Africa-Bound Group Trains For Missions

HARTFORD, Conn., July 20—Thirty-three young men and women, members of the "Fellowship of Christian Reconstruction in Africa," are taking an intensive six-week training course on the campus of Hartford Theological seminary. They will begin sailing after completing the course in August for three-year assignments in Algeria, Tunisia, Liberia, Southern Rhodesia, and the Belgian Congo under auspices of the board of missions and church extension, Methodist church.

Known as "Africa three's," the group is successor to classes of "three's" who went in 1948 to Japan, in 1949 to India, and in 1950 to Latin America. They will assist for at least three years in programs of evangelism and education, business administration, agriculture, and social work.

Twenty-one states are represented by the group. Texas leads with five. All are college-trained, and some have post-graduate professional degrees.

The group includes John Edward Kaemmer of Sumner, Wash., a 1951 graduate of Willamette university.

Hayesville Pastor Has Widely Varied Church Experience

HAYESVILLE, July 20 — The Rev. Robert E. Sanders, who has taken over the pastorate of Halbert Memorial Baptist church here, has a wide experience in music, teaching, radio and pastorate.

Born in Tacoma, Wash., in 1918, Sanders graduated from Prairie Bible institute in Alberta, Canada, has bachelor's and master's degrees from Whitworth college at Spokane and is working for a doctorate in theology.

He has pastored in Kinnikinnic, Wis.; Newport, Oakesdale and Ryderwood, Wash. He worked in radio evangelism for two years and from 1946 to 1950 taught music, homiletics and pastoral theology at Prairie institute, where he directed three choirs. He is a tenor soloist, pianist and accompanist.

Mrs. Sanders, native of St. Paul, Minn., has done children's work there and at Prairie institute. The Sanders' have three small boys.

Many members of Salem Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints plan to be in Portland Sunday at 7 p.m. to hear a talk by David O. McKay, Salt Lake City, new president of the church. No evening service will be held here.

This is the first northwest visit in several years by a president of the church, according to John E. Salisbury, local bishop. McKay will dedicate the new Hood River chapel Sunday.

Navy Reports On 11 Valley Area Members

A \$2,000,000 mobile display, designed to illustrate some of the U.S. navy's sea and air power, will open to the public at 1 p.m. today in downtown Salem.

The seven-truck exhibit, which arrived Friday, includes a Phantom jet fighter plane. Located on the High and State street sides of the Marion county courthouse square, the truck displays will be shown here today and Monday, from 1 to 9 p.m.

The gleaming white vans contain, among other things, a 20 mm aircraft gun, Geiger counter, a Banshee jet engine, parachutes, scale models of a navy carrier, submarine and mine sweeper, a dry dock display and a torpedo.

A feature of the exhibit is the display which shows the operation of a radar screen.

The exhibit, which is a nationwide tour, is sponsored by the public relations division of the navy in the interest of the local navy recruiting office, the naval reserve and information to the public regarding the naval program.

"This exhibit left Washington, D.C., last February 26," said Lt. Comdr. R. W. Weeks, officer in charge. "We estimate that about 6,000,000 have viewed it."

The mobile unit came to Salem Friday from Corvallis. It will leave here Tuesday for a three-day stay at Portland. Operations officer in charge of the 28 enlisted men crew is Lt. (jg) G. H. York.

In addition to the men, two Waves and one marine corps servicewoman travel with the unit and perform the clerical work. They are Ruth Shaver, yeoman, first class, and Julia Porter, storekeeper, both navy, and T.Sgt. Althea Partch.

McKay Urges Donations for Flood Relief

Gov. Douglas McKay Friday asked Oregon citizens to help Kansas and Missouri flood victims by donating to the Red Cross flood relief program.

A goal of five million dollars has been set for the nation, McKay said.

Red Cross leaders in Salem said the Marion county campaign would be short and "entirely voluntary," with no solicitations or fund-raising events planned. They asked residents throughout the county to help the campaign by donating money in the next few days, placing the contributions at any bank in the county or at the Red Cross office in Salem.

Engineer Chief Claims Flood Preventable

WASHINGTON, July 20 — (AP) — The disastrous midwestern flood could have been prevented — by a flood control project already planned, the chief of army engineers said today.

The chief, Maj. Gen. Lewis A. Pick, told a senate subcommittee that the project would have cost less than one-third of the possible billion dollars in damage caused by the Kansas-Missouri flood in the past week.

Pick reported to the senate's civil functions subcommittee following an on-the-spot survey of the flood area.

While he said he didn't want to make a prediction, he added, "It looks like this is a billion dollar flood." He said losses already had been conservatively estimated at \$875,000,000 with more to come around St. Louis.

Pick said that planned flood-control projects estimated to cost \$500,000,000 "would have enabled us to keep the flood waters of the Kansas river and its tributaries under control."

"It could have been prevented," he said. "I think the committee ought to know that."

Pick said the chief projects are three dams, already planned by army engineers and estimated to cost about \$125,000,000. They were planned for the Blue, Delaware and Republican rivers—all tributaries of the flood-swollen Kansas river.

Stader, who said he would dismiss the case against Snook, had requested the opinion of Neuner because he said "the law has not been too clear on the subject."

Police have been acting on the assumption, said Stader, that the state law did not provide for sirens on any private cars of police or fire officials.

Stader emphasized that the sirens, under the ruling, could only be used in emergency situations.

Snook was arrested July 10 in the Keizer area, and charged with reckless driving, in addition to the siren charge. Stader said Snook had pleaded guilty to the reckless driving count.

Neuner Rules Siren Legal; Case Dropped

Bernard Snook, Keizer assistant fire chief, will not have to face the charge of unauthorized use of emergency sirens, District Attorney E. O. Stader, Jr., said Friday.

Att. Gen. George Neuner ruled Friday that chiefs and assistant chiefs of rural fire protection districts may be authorized by directors of their fire district to carry sirens on their personal automobiles.

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Mail Service Changes Due For Westside

City mail delivery for some 75 houses on Salem's westside will begin Tuesday, Postmaster Albert C. Gragg announced Friday. Delivery will be by auto to roadside boxes, commonly known as mounted service.

The change will affect Wallace road as far north as Glen Creek road, Veal road, Estate and Fall drives and Glenview way.

No delivery changes will be made at this time on Moyer lane or Victory circle, said Gragg, but they are in process.

Patrons will be notified of any alterations necessary in boxes, according to the postmaster, while house numbers will be assigned by the city, to appear on both house and mailbox.
