Wootens Back In Salem to Make Home

Col. and Mrs. Elmer V. Wooten, long-time residents of Salem, have returned from Washington, D.C., and will take up residence again in their home at 240 E. Wilson st. Colonel Wooten, who was selective service director for Oregon from 1940 to 1947, is on indefinite leave from his post as administrative assistant to Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national selective service director.

"We certainly are glad to be back," the colonel said Friday, "and we hope to be settled here again early next month."

The colonel and Mrs. Wooten have been visiting their daughter Marjorie, in Portland, and spending some time in Salem at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Paulson. Their other daughter, Norma, now is secretary to the chief psychiatrist of Georgetown university hospital in Washington, D.C., and took over her parents' apartment there.

The Wootens left Salem three years ago. In the interim, the colonel developed a heart ailment which hospitalized him for some time, but is now recovered.

Colonel Wooten had a ringside seat at the attempted assassination of President Truman last year. He was in his office, across the street from Blair house, the president's temporary home, and hurried to the scene when the initial shots rang out.

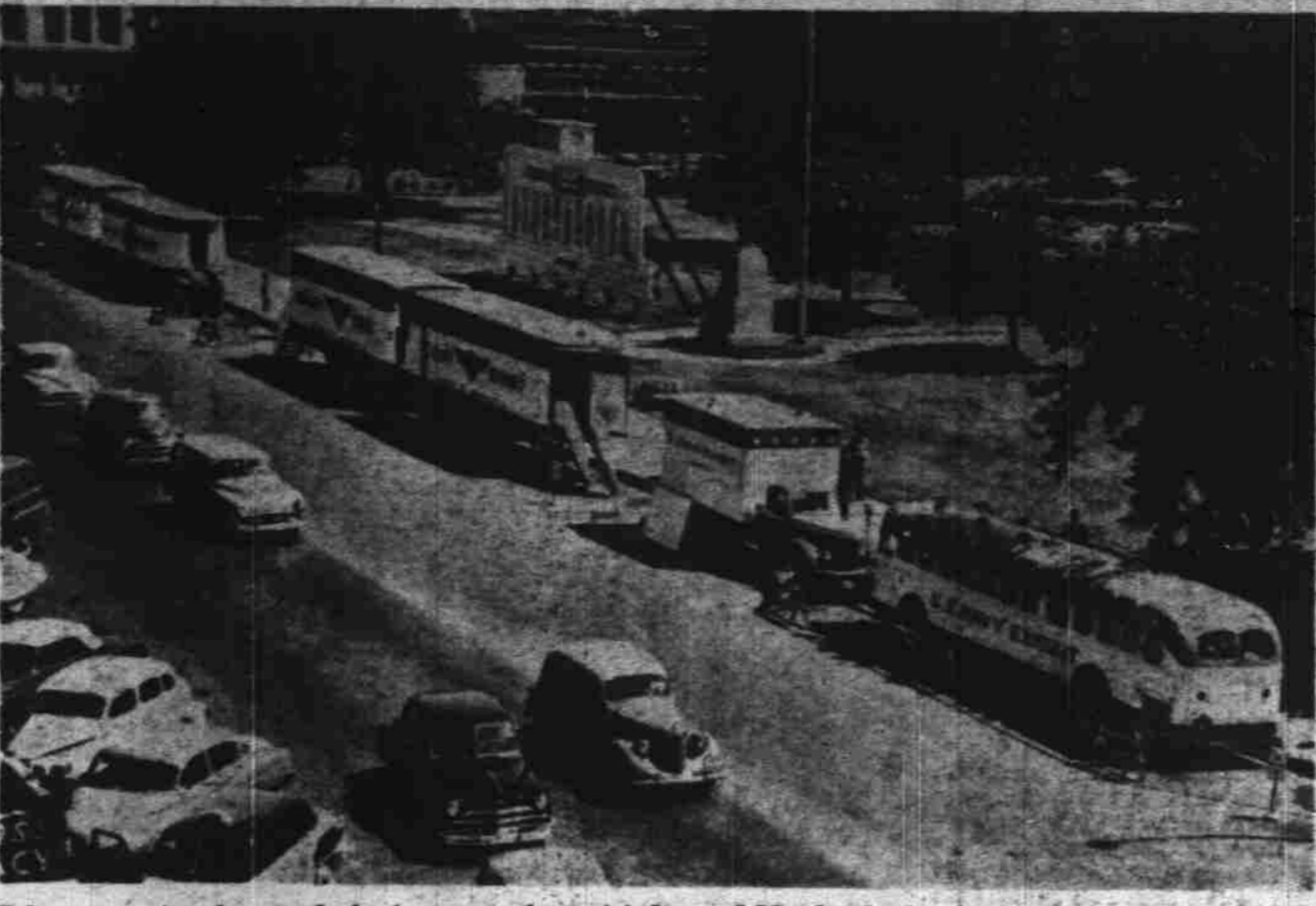

Persons who visit the U.S. navy exhibit today in Salem will be given an opportunity to get a free chest X-ray, too.

Officials of the Willamette valley chest X-ray program will set up a special mobile unit on the Marion courthouse square today from 1 to 9 p.m. The navy exhibit will be open during the same hours today and Monday at the square. Meanwhile the survey, which began Wednesday in Polk and Marion counties, will continue today in west Salem. X-ray units will be open to the public at Schmidt's store, 1115 Edgewater st., today from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

A unit for the public also will be open from 12 to 3 p.m. today at Kingwood market, 1311 Edgewater st. No units will operate in Marion county, other than the one in downtown Salem. Survey will continue next week with three X-ray machines operating in Marion county, seven in Yamhill and eight in Polk county. Open to the general public will be a machine stationed all of next week at the Marion county courthouse square.

Suspect Sent To Hospital For 30 Days

Cecil A. Marvel, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, was committed Friday at his own request to 30-days observation in the Oregon state hospital.

Circuit Court Judge R. Duncan continued the case for sentencing. The request for the revocation of the parole of Melvin Forcier was continued by Duncan in August 6 for further investigation. Forcier was convicted April 12, 1949, of non-support and given a one-year suspended sentence and five-years probation.

Also continued for sentencing until August 6 was the case of Clifford Milo Tibbets. He pleaded guilty June 16 to a charge of burglary not in a dwelling February 2 at a Salem agate and novelty shop.

Officers Report On Training

Lt. Col. Robert C. Irwin, commanding officer, and Capt. P. D. Van Ausdell reported Thursday night to the 8414th volunteer air reserve training squadron on recent training.

They had attended a two-weeks air force staff school at Long Beach, Calif. The air reserve group meets each Thursday night at city hall.

Skater Files Amended Suit In Bail Case

Jean Paul Leduc, through his attorney, filed Friday in circuit court an amended complaint in which he seeks \$5000 compensatory damages and \$25,000 punitive or exemplary damages from a Salem policeman.

Leduc, French-Canadian star of the Ice-Follies, declared in his complaint that he was "by force and violence incarcerated in jail" where he was kept in "a cell with drunken diseased and unclean people."

The complaint alleges that Leduc was restrained from "his lawful freedom and liberty," and that he "suffered severe and unusual mental anguish," and "was humiliated, worried and ashamed and damaged to the extent of \$5,000."

Leduc was arrested at 1:45 a.m. June 18 on a charge of violating the basic rule. The arresting officer instructed Leduc, according to his complaint, to go to the station and receive bail. There, it is alleged, the city desk sergeant, Don Nicholson, defendant in the suit, "wrongfully, maliciously and with oppression and malice refused to permit plaintiff to deposit bail in any amount notwithstanding bail in the amount as therefore fixed by the municipal judge for such alleged violation, \$30."

Leduc was later freed by a municipal court jury on the traffic violation charge.

Dismissed Men Request Hearing

Requests for hearings for three men dismissed by the Oregon liquor control commission have been received by the civil service commission.

The time and place for the hearings will probably be announced following the commission's monthly meeting July 25, James Clinton, civil service director said.

Courthouse Cupola Plans Move Ahead

Operation "Marion County Courthouse Memorial"—the transfer of the courthouse cupola to a new site took another step Friday when the Eagles committee, sponsors of the plan, met to set up plans.

One of the first steps taken by the committee since official announcement of the project, was the setting up of a trust fund to handle donations.

Chairman V.L. (Vick) Withrow, said the trust fund will be used for perpetual care of the memorial when it is installed in its permanent location, possibly Bush's Pasture park. Already, Withrow said, donations have been received by his committee.

Named to head sub-committees were Herbert Barker, charged with the task of removing and transporting the courthouse dome; Mayor Alfred Loucks, handling the city-county relations; and Elmer Church, in charge of the fund raising campaign. Withrow will handle the publicity and public relations.
