

# Tri-City Turns On Solon Club, Socks 11-4 Win

SANDERS FIELD, Kennewick, Wash., July 20.—(Special)—The Tri-City Braves turned on the Salem Senators tonight for an 11-4 victory in Western International league play after losing three in a row to the Solons at Salem earlier in the week. The Braves jumped out in front 3-0 after two innings, at the expense of starter Lorenz, and then began the rout in the fifth when Shortstop Bud Peterson slammed a bases-loaded home run.

This wallop drove Monroe out and Ludwig Lev finished up for the Senators. He fared little better as the Braves got to him for three runs in the sixth and another in the eighth.

Meanwhile soft-tossing Augie Zande checked the Solon swingers with nine hits, one a home run in the fifth inning by Bill Spaeter, his first of the season.

Salem collected two runs in the eighth on a double by Gene Tensell, a triple by Dick Faber and a single by Jess Stetter. In the ninth the Solons scored their final run on consecutive doubles by Dick Bartle and Jim McKeegan.

Al Spaeter and Sam Kanelos, each with three hits, led the victors at bat. Tansell and Faber got four of the nine Senator bingles.

The two teams play a doubleheader tomorrow night and conclude the series here with a single game Sunday. Tonight's win for Tri-City was but the third in 11 tries with Salem this season.

## College Group Not in Favor PCC Proposal

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., July 20.—(AP)—A Pacific Coast Conference proposal to eliminate spring football has stirred mixed reactions among the other major collegiate conferences. There's no rush to get on the PCC bandwagon.

Commissioners of the 10 major athletic conferences, here for a meeting of the National Association of Collegiate Commissioners, indicated that most of them oppose favoring spring conditioning for football players.

Victor O. Schmidt, Pacific Coast commissioner, said his conference would present a proposal for nationwide abandonment of spring football before the national collegiate athletic association later this year.

Schmidt said his conference members feel the spring workouts "unduly extend the season during which the football player is required to devote his attention to intercollegiate sports."

## Gillihan Sad Over Mistake

Frank Gillihan, Tacoma Tigers business manager who earlier in the week was credited with having said he was going to Canada to sell both the Tacoma and the Salem Senators Western International league baseball franchises, was a "sorry and apologetic" man Friday when he telephoned from Tacoma to explain to Senators Business Manager Mike Radian that it was all a big mistake.

Said said Gillihan in part, "The recent statements contributed to me were without foundation. My recent trip to Canada was in the interests of the Tacoma club only. I have enough problems here in Tacoma without trying to sell someone else's franchise."

A Canadian writer issued the story that Gillihan was trying to sell both franchises at Calgary and Edmonton. When the report reached Salem it was promptly smashed by Don Young, president of the Senators, Inc., and labeled as not only fictional but childish.

Gillihan added Friday that he and Owner Bill Stave of San Diego fully hoped to be able to keep the WIL franchise in Tacoma.

## Penn Television Dispute Now Over

PHILADELPHIA, July 20.—(AP)—The University of Pennsylvania has agreed to a "changed" NCAA television plan, but still hopes to telecast five games. Athletic Director Francis T. Murray said today.

Murray announced that Penn has agreed to report to NCAA on all revenues, attendance and contracts, and to pay its share of the approved expenses of the NCAA television committee. He said the university would abide by whatever decision the NCAA television committee makes on its request to telecast five home games, including the Army and Navy games.

After conferring with university President Harold E. Stassen all morning, Murray issued a statement explaining that Penn had ended its two-month long dispute with the NCAA.

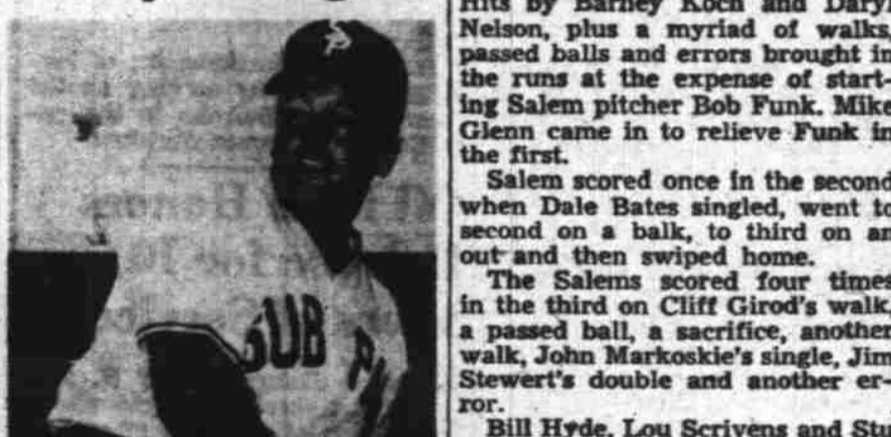
Bill Hyde, Lou Scrivens and Stu Fredericks shared the mound chores for the winners. The loss was Salem's first in the tournament.
