Adm. Sherman Funeral Held At Arlington

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—Admiral Forest F. Sherman was buried today in Arlington cemetery with President Truman there to say goodbye for the nation.

For the admiral who also was a statesman and airman, there gathered in the sun-lit marble amphitheater the ambassadors and ministers of Washington's embassies. Overhead, as the cortège made its slow march across the Potomac to the cemetery, was the high thunder of warplanes.

In the long column of men from all the armed forces which followed the casket, borne on a gun caisson, were two platoons from the Naval academy. Sherman was a midshipman there a little more than 30 years ago.

Mr. Truman sat in the hot sun of the amphitheater, flanked by Secretary of State Acheson, and by Secretary of Defense Marshall. They joined in the responses in the Episcopal service. The president looked across at the bronze casket, draped by the flag, glanced occasionally over the audience.

In Sherman's passing the president lost not only a friend but also his chief of naval operations and a member of the joint chiefs of staff.

Among those in the somber audience were officers and men with whom Sherman had served in his many commands, ashore and on the ships at sea. Some were old men, wearing five stars. Some were young, wearing the uniform of the seaman.

Sherman, 54, died last Sunday after a heart attack in Naples, Italy. He had gone to Europe a week earlier to carry out negotiations with Spain for the use of air and naval bases as part of the European defense system.

Fire Danger To Increase In Northwest

The forest fire danger will increase in the Pacific northwest today, particularly in the southern and eastern parts of Oregon.

The weather bureau warned that humidity there would drop to dangerous levels under a scorching sun.

The warning came as two fires were reported in timber on Look-out mountain, 10 miles north of Durkee in eastern Oregon's Blue mountains. Their size was not determined at once. Foresters said they were in remote areas, and fire fighters would have to hike over roadless mountains to reach the scene.

A number of other fires were controlled, including a 250-acre blaze north of Rogue river in southern Oregon.

Woman Hurt in Albany Crash

One woman was hospitalized after a two-car collision on highway 99-E near the north city limits of Albany Friday night, state police reported.

In Albany General hospital was Mrs. John Howden, Pontiac, Mich., with severe leg lacerations and internal injuries. Her husband, driver of the car, and daughter, Mary, were treated for minor lacerations. Driver of the other auto, Thomas Alonzo Casto, Los Angeles, Calif., also was treated for minor lacerations, state police reported.

Pakistan Calls Up 4 More Battalions

KARACHI, Pakistan, July 27 (AP)—Prime Minister Liaquat Ali Khan vowed with a clenched fist today that Pakistan would not bow before "any aggression."

He made the fist his symbol in an impromptu speech to Defense day paraders demonstrating against India.

His government earlier had disclosed a call-up of four more guard battalions in the midst of the war of hot words with India over Kashmir.

La Forges Praise Fire Fighters

SUNNYSIDE, July 27 (AP)—Things are back at normal around the C. O. LaForge home on the old Pacific highway near here, after last week's brush fire got in timber and threatened the house of the LaForges place.

The LaForges said this week their loss, about 10 acres of timber, might have been much worse but for the two-day spirited fight put up against the fire by virtually all their neighbors and men from the Turner and Jefferson junction fire departments.

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Sheridan Motorcyclist Injured in Wreck

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Sociology Student to Take Notes On Raft Trip of 2 Men, Women

MOUNDSVILLE, W. Va., July 27 (AP)—Four young experimenters in social conduct fished their belongings from the Ohio river today, still bent on floating down to New Orleans.

They want to learn what happens to mind and manners when two bachelors and two women have to live cooped up together for several weeks on a 12-by-20-foot raft.

"It was sad when the great ship went down," they sang, from a ballad about the sinking of the "Titanic."

Their great ship, called "Lethargia," was upside down near the West Virginia shore at Round Bottom, just downstream from Moundsville.

"Lethargia" capsized yesterday after hitching a tow with a big river tug. The tug was too fast. It swamped the raft, built on oil drums with a canvas covered cabin about eight feet square.

Mary Ellen McGrady, a 24-year old sociology student at the University of Michigan, and Geraldine Garcia, 23-year-old artist from Boston, managed to scramble aboard the tug.

Milton Borden, 30, from New Bedford, Mass., swam to the tug. Don Brown, 24-year-old Michigan student from Detroit, went down for a long time. But he came up, grabbed an oar and swam to the West Virginia shore.

Mary Ellen is leader of the expedition, which set out from New Kensington, Pa. She planned to take notes of the adjustments the four make in order to get along together in close confinement.

"Silly," she called complaints about unmarried men and women riding together on the raft. All have "other romantic interest," she explained.

GI 'Souvenir' Said Priceless Korean Rug

PUEBLO, Colo., July 27 (AP)—Hold up your bids on that luxurious \$100,000 leopard skin rug. The Korean government is considering buying back the souvenir which Sgt. Elvire H. Giltner sent home from Korea. There's a chance that it's a "priceless national treasure."

Sergeant Giltner mailed it to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh V. Giltner last month. It's made of 48 matched leopard skins and is 18½ by eight feet.

One look convinced the Giltners it was "beautiful, but too big for our house." They offered it to the highest bidder, passing along their son's \$25,000 estimate of its value, and put it in storage.

The Korean consul general in New York, David Hankoong, saw a newspaper photograph of it, and thought it looked like one which once adorned the palace of the late Queen Min. He appraised it at \$100,000.

The Korean embassy in Washington cabled a description of Pusan today for a check of its authenticity.

"If it appears genuine we shall try to get it back, of course reimbursing the sergeant for any expense he went to in getting the rug and sending it to his home," the spokesman said.

Giltner said he bought it from a "goat" and that it came from the Chang Duk palace.

He said he paid 150,000 Korean won, or about \$61 in American currency, for the rug. It cost nearly \$40 to mail it home.

A. E. Hedine Succumbs to Long Illness

Andrew Edward Hedine, 75, died Friday at a Salem hospital, after several months of illness. He had been a farmer in Oregon for many years and had lived more recently in Salem where he was working in a cannery this summer.

He leaves a widow, Helen R. Hedine, 549 S. 18th st.; daughter, Mrs. Laura Keith, John Day; brother, Hjalmar Hedine, Salem.

The funeral will be held at 10:30 a.m. Monday at Howell-Edwards chapel, with the Rev. Louis E. White officiating. Burial will be at IOOF cemetery.

He was a native of Sweden but was raised in Kansas and lived there until coming to Oregon in 1913.

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E. Merl Young Linked to Boyle In RFC Story

ST. LOUIS, July 27 (AP)—The name of E. Merl Young was added today by the Post-Dispatch to the list of figures which it says exerted influence in obtaining a \$565,000 RFC loan for a St. Louis printing firm.

Young is a former Washington examiner for the RFC. He was identified by the Fulbright senate subcommittee on banking as a key figure in RFC lending decisions before the agency's recent shake-up.

Young was not reachable in Washington for comment. Both telephones listed for him have been disconnected.

It was the \$3,450 mink coat of his wife, a White house stenographer, which stirred the country several months ago.

The Post-Dispatch reported earlier this week that William M. Boyle Jr., democratic national chairman, and James P. Finnegan, former internal revenue collector here, helped promote the loan to the American Lithofold corporation.

The loan to Lithofold came through in 1949, after its application had been turned down three times.

In its earlier stories, the Post-Dispatch said Boyle was paid \$8,000 for helping engineer the loan while employed by the firm in 1949. Boyle acknowledged having worked for the company but he denied that he was in any way connected with the loan.

Ingrid Bergman Visits Daughter

LONDON, July 27 (AP)—Ingrid Bergman slipped into Britain from Italy for a quiet reunion with her 12-year-old daughter Jenny Ann, the child disclosed today.

"I saw mummy and spent several hours with her at her private home," Jenny Ann told reporters. "It was wonderful to see her again."

The actress' former husband, Dr. Peter Lindstrom of Hollywood, confirmed the meeting as he and Jenny Ann took off for Sweden.

Miss Bergman had not seen Jenny Ann since 1949, the year she went to Italy to make a movie for Italy Movie Director Roberto Rossellini, now her husband.

Lindstrom would not tell reporters whether Miss Bergman is still in Britain or if he saw her. "And don't ask me if I'm still in love with her," he said, "because I wouldn't tell you."

Car Rolls, Driver Emerges Unhurt

City Fireman Thomas G. Stettler, 1355 Jefferson st., knows how to come up on his feet, according to a state police report.

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—The house today voted 376 to 0 to end the formal state of war with Germany more than six years after the shooting stopped in May, 1945. The war began Dec. 11, 1941.

The resolution, requested by President Truman, now goes to the senate.

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Dallas Man Found Dead

DALLAS—Charles A. Kramer, about 65, was found shot to death Friday night at the home of a son here, an apparent suicide, Polk County Deputy Coroner Lawrence Goode said. He was shot in the head with a 22 caliber rifle.

Members of the family heard the shot and found him in an upstairs bedroom. He was pronounced dead on arrival of Goode, who said circumstances of the death and a note left by Kramer indicated suicide.

Kramer was reported to have been in ill health for some time. He is survived by several sons and daughters.

Threat of Ford Closure Eases

DETROIT, July 27 (AP)—Threat of a nationwide Ford Motor company shutdown was eased at least temporarily late today as UAW-CIO workers at the company's small but important supplier plant at Monroe, Mich., voted to end a wildcat walkout.

The 1,700 Monroe employees agreed to return after International UAW representatives met with the membership of local 723 at Monroe.

Ken Bannon, national director of the UAW's Ford department, advised the workers to "follow contract procedure." Bannon said the men would return at Midnight Sunday. They walked out yesterday.
