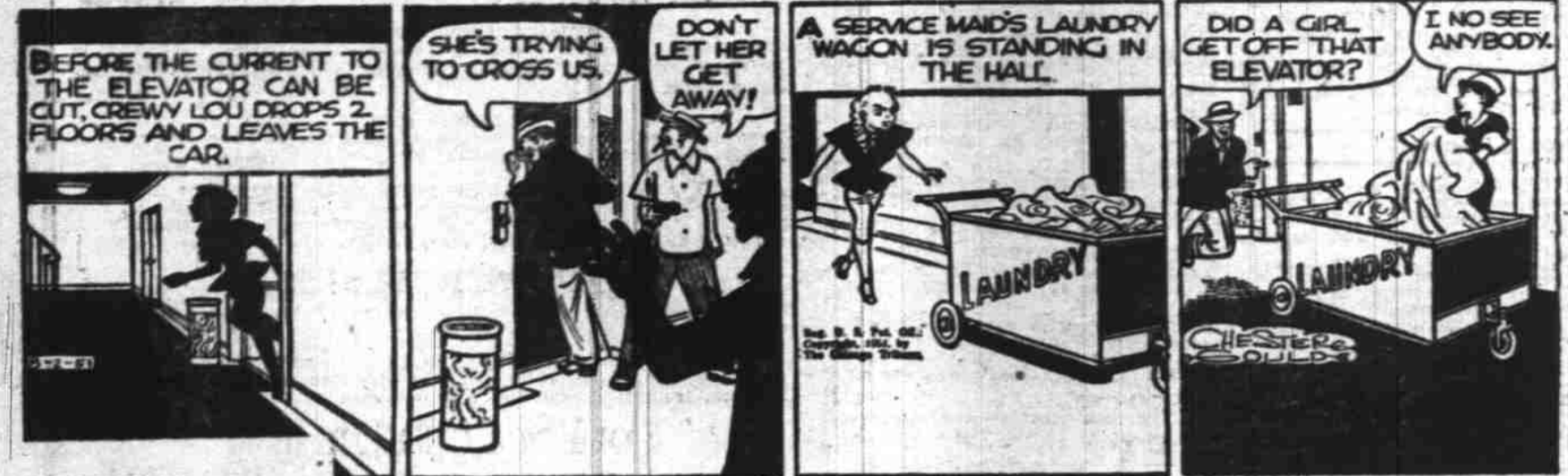

Wheat Sales Boost Prices

CHICAGO, Aug. 1 (AP)—Heavy sales of cash wheat to Germany provided the main stimulus for a strong wheat market on the board of trade today.

With wheat ending on gains ranging around 2 cents, corn, oats and rye also made headway on the upside. The bullish enthusiasm did not extend to soybeans and lard, however. They eased with a general weakness in fats and oils.

Wheat closed 1 1/2-2 1/4 higher, corn 1/2-3/4 higher, oats 1/2 to 2 cents higher, rye (new style) 1/4-3/4 higher, soybeans unchanged to 1/4 lower and lard 10 to 27 cents a hundred pounds lower.
