## Rush to Buy Colored Oleo Said Lacking

Salem housewives made no big rush Thursday to buy oleomargarine that was colored without their labors, as the legislative act ending Oregon's ban on colored oleo went into effect.

Stores were well-stocked with the changed product, at prices generally one cent above those recently for plain oleo, although some prices remained the same. Stores said the increase was due to wrapping of individual cubes.

Although advertising was prominent, unique store displays of the new yellow oleo were not found. Little of the uncolored variety was on hand because dealers had let their stocks dwindle and some distributors picked up remaining cartons.

Most stores said buying yesterday was above normal for the day, but not extremely so.

The 38-year prohibition on colored oleo sales in Oregon was ended by last spring's legislature, which at first had voted to retain the ban.

## Peace Said Basis for U. S. Policies

"War is not inevitable," a veteran U.S. statesman declared Thursday before the Salem Lions club. "Our foreign policy would be entirely different today if we thought that it was," said Carlton Savage, Salem-area native who has spent the past 25 years with the U. S. state department.

The graying, erect speaker recalled that he was born "in a gully between Squirrel Hill and Sunnyside" but usually referred to Salem as his home town. "The Kremlin is out for a world dominated by communism and all of our foreign policy is formulated with that in mind," Savage asserted. "As a central part of that policy we are building physical strength, hoping we shall never have to use it."

There is more emphasis on consultation with the military than ever before in forming policy," he added.

Savage deplored today's foreign-policy scene as "not a pretty picture," but added, "there can be no clear-cut policy that has all desirable features (today); this is bad, that's bad, but you've got to choose one, and none are a very happy solution."

There is danger for the United States to go in for appeasement on one hand, and danger to go in for too much armament on the other, Savage said.

"It's like walking a tight rope," he added. "A lively, off-the-record question period followed Savage's formal remarks. He is executive secretary of the state department's policy-forming committee."

## Morse Support Plan Dropped By Anderson

Steve Anderson, Salem attorney and state young republican leader, announced Thursday he is dropping plans to put U.S. Sen. Wayne Morse's name on the Oregon republican presidential primary ballot next May.

Anderson's decision came after Morse asked his supporters to stop trying to make Morse a favorite son candidate. Morse also asked Oregon republicans to elect liberal delegates to the republican national convention.

Anderson said that with Morse out of the running, he would support General Eisenhower for the republican presidential nomination.

Moves already are underway to put Eisenhower on both the democratic and republican presidential primary ballots in Oregon.
