

### Fighting Steps Up in Korea; Planes Active

U. S. EIGHT ARMY HEAD-QUARTERS, Korea, Saturday, Aug. 11.—(P)—Savage local fighting flared on the eastern front yesterday as allied forces battled to oust stubborn communist defenders from commanding terrain.

Objectives of the limited allied attacks southwest of Kaesong were hills from 1,200 to 1,500 feet high that dominate the road leading north of Inje to the mountain fastness south of Wonsan.

One action began at 2 a.m. yesterday and was still raging 22 hours later with the final result undetermined.

Elsewhere on the muddy front there was only light patrol contact. Allied warplanes Friday flew 636 sorties through cloudy weather, hammering key communist rail centers in the northwest.

Pyeongang, Korean communist capital, and railway yards at Hwangju bore the brunt of the fiery air assaults.

Pilots Thursday night had reported an "unusually large" flow of communist traffic along the highways — an estimated 2,400 moving to and from the battle-front.

So, beginning at daybreak, Fifth air force bombers and fighters struck vehicles wherever they could be spotted through the rain and low overcast. There was no immediate report of results of the 233 mission flown during the day.

On the ground, communist patrols made small probing attacks on the central front—near Kumhwa—but these were thrown back.

The Pyongyang radio boasted that 40,474 casualties had been inflicted on the allies since the armistice talks began at Kaesong July 10. The radio said 488 allied planes were shot down and 15 tanks destroyed.

(In Washington, the army announced casualties reached 1,237, 872—an increase of 9,018 in eight days. Communist battle casualties were estimated at 890,756).

JEFFERSON—The Jefferson city council has ordered a pump, costing \$2,035, from G. M. Slezak in Salem. The bid was on a 200-gallon per minute pump.

The bid also promised delivery within 10 days. The pump will be installed in the new 220-gallon test well to supplement the city's diminishing water supply.

The council also bought material for pump house and base for pump and connections.

### Truman Home Airport Hit; Vote Delayed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—An argument over locating a new \$19,000,000 air force installation in President Truman's home county today brought a week-end delay in house action on a \$5,768,000,000 military construction bill.

The \$19,000,000 would be used to expand the airport at Grandview, in Jackson county, Mo. Grandview was the home of Mr. Truman's mother and he has used its airport on various trips back home.

Rep. Gross (R-Iowa) sought to knock out the Grandview item, pointing out there is an air force field at nearby Sedalia, Mo., and suggested it be used instead.

Gross' motion to strike out the item was defeated, 56 to 15. The air force announced some time ago that it planned to move headquarters of the continental air command from Mitchell Field, Long Island, to Grandview, with the project to cost \$19,000,000.

After his defeat, Gross moved to send the whole bill back to the committee with instructions to remove the Grandview item. Leaders decided to take a vote on this Monday.
