Portland Building Contractor Dies In Columbia River

PORTLAND, Aug. 12-(AP)—Galen Roy Hord, 43, a Portland building contractor, drowned early today in the Columbia river.

Sheriff's Deputy Mel Farmer said the man drowned at about 2 a.m. during a midnight swim near a line of houseboats on N.W. Marine Drive.

Farmer said the drowning occurred after Hord and the wife of a houseboat tenant, Mrs. John Godfrey, had gone in for a swim. When Hord called for help, the woman's husband, who was on the shore, swam out in a rescue attempt. The Godfreys were picked up by the moorage owner who went out in his tug. Hord had disappeared.

The body was recovered this morning.

Hord is survived by a widow and two teen-aged children.

U.S. Troops Land in Italy To Build Base

LEGHORN, Italy, Aug. 12-(AP)—Fourteen hundred serious-faced American soldiers landed at this west coast port today. It was the first large scale arrival of American troops in Italy since allied armies liberated the country from fascism.

Communist efforts to disrupt their arrival by a strike of 14,000 Red-controlled dock workers failed.

There was only the normal Sunday calm in this communist-governed city beside the sunny Termerian.

All but 100 of the new arrivals left immediately by train to reinforce U.S. occupation forces in Austria. They will go through the Brenner Pass in the first use of the new supply line intended to safeguard U.S. Austrian forces from any sudden attack which might cut off the former route across Germany.

The 12,500-ton transport General R. E. Callan pulled alongside at 8 a.m.

A white-uniformed 70-piece Italian air force band broke into the "Ordinance March of the Italian Air Force" as the ship drew alongside. Hundreds of American soldiers clad in green fatigues applauded after the number, but there was none of the usual cheering or horseplay which normally marks the arrival of a transport in peacetime.

Expansion of Air Reserve Brings Call for Personnel

Formation of the 922nd reserve training wing, stationed at Portland air base, has brought on a demand for qualified personnel in the air force reserve training group, Col. Frank A. Flynn, commander, announced Saturday.

Greatest need at the present time is for officers and airmen who can do administrative work, Flynn said. Rated personnel who have the background to qualify them for administrative jobs, however, also were urged to contact wing headquarters in building 24 at the base.

Commanding the 922nd is Lt. Col. Robert W. Sheets, Portland, former commander of the 9090th volunteer air reserve training group.

Quiet Inquiry At West Point Expected Soon

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12-(AP)—Senators report that they expect a quiet check to be made into the situation at West Point after the present furor about moves to oust 90 cadets for cribbing has died down.

Senator Ellender (D-La.) told a newsmen the checkup can be made by the official "Board of Visitors" to the West Point and Annapolis academies.

Chairman Russell (D-Ga.) of the senate Armed Services committee, in a separate interview, agreed with Ellender that "this probably is the best way to look into the situation."

Some legislators believe the boards of visitors may be what President Truman had in mind this week when he told a news conference he was having a check-up made.

Official "Boards of Visitors" to the officer training centers have existed for more than 30 years, although congress spelled out their duties by law three years ago.

Public Forum On India Set for YM Thursday

A public forum on the future of India, "Will She Go East or West?" is slated for 8 p.m. Thursday in Salem YMCA. Guest speakers will be A. J. Muste, author and lecturer from New York, and Dr. Victor H. Sword of Salem, former missionary to India.

The forum was arranged by a committee comprising Cecil Wickline, Mrs. Ethel Bowes, David Poindexter and Mrs. Marvin Nettleton.

Muste has been national secretary of the American Fellowship of Reconciliation since 1940, has served on the faculty of Columbia university and Union Theological seminary and is a former president of Brookwood Labor college. He is the author of several books. In 1949 he spent some time in India. Sword spent 22 years in missionary work in India and was in Assam province until coming to Salem two years ago. He is chairman of Salem Council of Churches and assistant chairman of the state program for relief to Korea and India.

Ex-Prisoner of Jap Occupation Visits in Salem

A man who lived and worked through the days of the Japanese occupation of the Philippine islands in World War II is visiting in Salem for the next several days. He is Alex Moffat, construction engineer for Standard Vacuum Oil Co. at Manila. He is now on the last leg of a six-months leave of absence from his job. He has been with the company for the past 25 years.

Moffat, a Scotsman by birth, but who hopes to become an American citizen one day, was manager of the oil terminal at Manila when the war broke out.

Under direction of the U.S. army he supervised the dynamiting of oil tanks of his and several other large companies on Dec. 31, 1941.

The Japanese landed at Manila Jan. 2, 1942.

Moffat was interned at notorious Santo Tomas prison with his wife and two young daughters. Later under the Japanese he helped restore the destroyed oil terminal and worked on Corregidor and Northern Luzon.

He was returned to Santo Tomas camp, where he remained until liberated.

Moffat is visiting here with Mr. and Mrs. Don Madison, 1565 N. 24th st. He says he would like to visit with any serviceman in the Salem area who might have been on Corregidor when he was.
