Buying for Your Home

Homemakers Find Many Uses for the New Small Plastic Gadgets Available

 Small plastic items in the new housewares collections on the market will serve many purposes about the home. Many have ingenious little features in addition to the easy-to-care-for plastic materials of which they are made.
 A new type of hanger is made of a hook with a spring clip base. The hook will fit over a shower rod, clothes line, hanger or knob. The clip has polished, rounded ends to prevent snagging when used for hosiery or lingerie. This is a handy item to have when traveling or for general daily laundry use in the home.
 Another gadget is a two piece sink strainer. The second part is a cover that can also be used as

a base to transport the strainer to the garbage pail, or placed over the strainer to conceal refuse while working at the sink.

A new plastic measuring cup has a lever that sets the measure at six different levels, from one-fourth to a full cup. Whatever amount you want, you just fill the cup to the top once the measure is set.

Other kitchen items include funnels, strainers, meat tenderizers, and spoons for dry and liquid containers.

Mrs. Ronda E. Shaw, a Chicago housewife, has designed a lattice pie cutter of plastic with a pattern of four leaf clovers. She also has a plastic roll cutter, for fan tail and clover leaf rolls.

New plastic serving pieces include bread trays, hot plates, combination cake servers and relish dishes, sea food cocktail servers, birthday placecard holders, butter dishes and decorated juvenile drinking cups.
