

Bevens Flips 4-2 Nod Over Braves

Gives 4 Hits, Fans 10 for No. 18

KENNEWICK, WASH., Aug. 12 (Special)—The Salem Senators got a brilliant four-hit and 10-strikeout pitching performance from their Bill Bevens tonight to beat Tri-City 4-2 and take the final game of the series here after Tri-City had won the first three. When Bevens came to bat in the ninth inning he was given a tremendous ovation by the Tri-City fans.

The victory was Bevens' 18th of the season. Lou McCollum was the loser despite giving five hits. It was McCollum's 11th loss against 10 wins.

In the eighth inning Bevens ran his strikeout total to 108, one of the top whiff marks in the circuit. His 16 wins are surpassed only by the 21 owned by Vancouver's Bob Snyder.

Salem went 2-0 ahead in the first inning on a walk to Richie Myers, another to Gene Tansell, Dick Faber's ground-out and Glenn Stetter's single to center for the two tallies.

Bill Spaer's double in the sixth, a ground out and Hugh Luby's fly produced another run for Salem after Luby had tripled and Dick Bartle had singled to make it 3-0 for the Senators in the fourth.

Bevens lone bad inning came in the eighth when Ken Michelson opened the bottom half with a 350-foot home run over the left field fence. Bevens then walked McCollum, yielded the third straight hit to Bill Edelstein, got Vic Buccola on a pop-up and walked Bud Peterson to fill the sacks. Clint Cameron flew out to left field, scoring a runner after the catch, and then Neil Bryant fanned to retire the side.

The Senators have Monday off and will open a three-game series at Salem with Vancouver's Caps starting Tuesday night. The Salem team still is firmly established in third place in the league standings.

Honor System Takes Beating

William & Mary Coach Resigns Under Cloud

WILLIAMSBURG, Va., Aug. 12 (AP)—The resignation of two top coaches at the College of William and Mary brought into the open a new sports scandal at the institution, which boasts the oldest honor system in the nation.

News that football coach and athletic director R. N. (Rube) McCray and basketball coach Barney Wilson had quit their posts came as a shocking surprise to almost everyone. Both coaches had been highly successful.

A crisis in the department of athletics began almost two years ago when Dr. Nelson Marshall became dean of the college.

The explosive situation was ignited yesterday by Al Vandeweghe, an assistant to McCray from 1947 to 1950.

Vandeweghe revealed that he had been questioned by a faculty representative about "certain high school transcripts which . . . had been changed in order to allow prospective football players to gain admission to William and Mary."

Almost immediately, McCray and Wilson announced their resignations. Both said they were quitting voluntarily and had not been asked to do so. Neither was mentioned specifically in connection with the "malpractices."

Dr. Marshall on July 9 announced a sweeping reorganization of the department of athletics and physical education, effective Sept. 1. The plan divorced the physical education department from the department of athletics, removing it from McCray's control.

Charges of "malpractices" hit the William and Mary coach R. N. (Rube) McCray resigned, along with basketball coach Barney Wilson. Trouble came in investigation of alteration of athletes' grades.

Doubleheaders Draw 177,110

NEW YORK, Aug. 12 (AP)—Four doubleheaders and four single games attracted 177,110 baseball fans to the major league ball parks today. The American league played to 105,596 customers and the National loop drew 71,514 spectators.

Municipal stadium, Cleveland, produced the day's top crowd of 49,547 fans, who saw the Indians whip the Chicago White Sox, 7-1, to gain undisputed possession of first place in the American league.

The smallest turnout of the day was at Sportman's Park, St. Louis, where 11,550 fans saw the Cardinals edge the Cincinnati Reds, 4-3.

Pearce Hero of Nods Over F-Grove, Eugene

Those who figured Salem's Capital Post No. 9 American Legion junior baseballers didn't belong in the state tournament at Waters field are humming another tune today. For the C-Ps, as fine a clan of never-say-die lads as you'll find last night knocked over both Forest Grove and Eugene, eliminating both, and tonight tangled with the defending champion Contact Lumbermen of Portland for the championship.

And to Righthander Lowell Pearce, a fast-working husky who seems to get better as he goes along, goes a tremendous portion of the credit for lifting Coach Vince Genna's team to its lofty standing of the present. Of the three games the Salems have now won, Pearce has capped all three with his amazing stability and effectiveness. He won both games last night, first by going 7½ innings to get credit for a 6-5 verdict over Forest Grove, and then by relieving Chub Larson in the eighth and going on to gain credit for the 9-7 decision over Eugene. Larson had relieved Pearce in the opener, helping to save that one.

So tonight at 6:30 the starting Salem team undertakes another major task that parallels the two already encountered and conquered. Salem must defeat the fortunate. Contacts twice tonight to win the title. Genna has both Steve Merchant and Ron Whitaker ready for mound service, and win or lose the Salem team will be the sweetheart of this tourney.

The wackiness of the draw in a five-team double-elimination tourney has seen the Contacts play but two games thus far while Salem has had to play four in a pair of doubleheaders.

Eugene led 4-0 at one time, surrendered to a six-run Salem rally in the seventh, scored three themselves in the eighth and then saw Salem put the game away with two more runs in the ninth.

Genna's gang won the first game with a five-run outburst in the opening frame and another single counter in the third for a 6-0 bulge. Righthander Lowell Pearce, who had a 10-4 nod over Forest Grove Friday afternoon breezed through the Grovers again until the eighth when he was lifted for Chub Larson. After fanning 11 Forest Grovers in the first six innings, Pearce grew wild and finally had to yield to Larson.

Were it not for a weird display of infelding support in the seventh, worth three runs for the Grovers on only one hit, chances are Pearce might have gone the route. Two errors during the frame caused considerable of the misery.

When Pearce walked the bases loaded in the eighth, Genna replaced him with Larson who immediately wild pitched in a run and then fanned first-sacker Byron White to retire the side. Larson had some tall flinging to do in the ninth also after a walk and a hit by Dave Whiteman put runners at first and third with two outs. But Larson got Larry Brown to bounce back to the pitcher for an easy third out and the ball game.

Salem's five-run opening frame came about when Jim Brown beat out an infield hit and both Jim Rice and Bill Nelson beat out bunt hits to fill the bases with one out. Phil Jantz then squeezed Brown across on a bunt to L. J. Tupper, third-baseman. When Tupper's throw to the plate went wild, Rice scored also and Nelson went to second. Rod Hales then drilled a single to center to score both runners and later scored himself on another boot by Tupper.

Three more F-Grove errors (they made seven for the game) resulted in Nelson scoring in the third.

Pearce and Larson held the Grovers to five hits while Salem got seven, three of those by Hales. The first-inning riot sent Lefty Marv Scherpt out and the hard-working Carl Meeuwson finished up. Meeuwson was kayaked by Salem Friday but did a bangup relief job for the Grovers in their win over Hood River Saturday.

Pearce was credited with the win, his second for the tourney.

Wins \$12,500 Top Money

Ben Hogan Cards 66 For Tam Open Win

CHICAGO, Aug. 12 (AP)—Invincible Ben Hogan slammed a pair of 33's for a 66 today to win golf's biggest jackpot—\$12,500—with a 15-under-par 273 in Tam O'Shanter's "World" championship.

Hogan, who boosted his winnings in five official tournaments this season to \$20,400, trailed Jimmy Demaret, the 54-hole leader by five strokes entering the last round.

But his brilliant 33 wiped out four of the debts at 63 holes when Demaret wilted to a 37 on the first nine.

Little Ben never eased off on the pressure-packed back side and methodically shot another 33. Demaret required another 37 to get home for a 74 and a 276 total and \$5,000.

Pete Cooper, the perennial contender from White Plains, N. Y., banked a final 69 while Bobby Locke and his newly found putting touch added 70, each to finish at 277 and win \$2,750.

Lawson Little of Pebble Beach, Calif., making one of his best bids in years, fashioned his third straight 70 for 278 to be locked in that bracket with Clayton Heafner, the big Charlotte, N. C., veteran who once again was a victim of last-round jitters and soared to 73. Each earned \$2,100.

Cary Middlecoff of Memphis, who won the Tam All-American crown last week, reeled off a respectable pair of 35's for 179 and seventh place. His swag was \$1,800.

Grouped at 280, worth \$1,650 for each, were Sam Snead and Lloyd Mangrum. Both took closing 73's.

Hogan, who staged rousing finishes to win the Masters' and his third National Open this year, was his machine-like self in returning to Tam for the first time in four years and tying a ribbon around it.

The only time he was over par was on the first hole, where he overshot the green from the rough and took a 5.

Mike Garcia In 4-Hitter

Dodgers, Giants Continue Pace

NEW YORK, Aug. 12 (AP)—Husky Mike Garcia pitched the torrid Cleveland Indians to their tenth straight victory today and into undisputed possession of first place in the American league pennant race as he stopped the Chicago White Sox, 7-1.

Garcia's classy four-hitter enabled the Tribe to break their first place tie with the New York Yankees who suffered a severe jolt in Philadelphia as they lost a doubleheader to the Athletics, 8-3 and 7-4.

The third place Boston Red Sox moved within five games of the top by dumping the Washington Senators twice, 6-2 and 6-2. The Detroit Tigers nipped the St. Louis Browns, 2-1.

In the National league, the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers swamped the Boston Braves, 7-2. The runner-up New York Giants captured a twin bill from the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2 and 2-1. The Pittsburgh Pirates swapped shut-outs with the Chicago Cubs, winning the opener, 1-0, but losing the nightcap, 6-0. The St. Louis Cardinals edged the Cincinnati Reds, 4-3.

Garcia's gem, before 48,547 fans, was his 16th victory of the season and his tenth against one defeat in the last seven weeks. Garcia blanked the White Sox after the first inning.

The A's routed rookies Tom Morgan and Bob Weisler of the Yankees in their sweep at Philadelphia. The A's pounded Morgan and two relief pitchers for 17 hits in the first game to end Morgan's eight game winning streak. Eddie Joost, with four hits and Elmer Valo with three, paced the bombardment.

Weisler was driven to cover in the third inning of the nightcap as the A's scored twice to tie the score at 4-4. The A's broke the tie with two in the sixth against Jack Kramer and remained in the van.

Ray Scarborough and Bill Wright turned in eight hitters in turning back the Senators at Boston. The Red Sox collected ten hits in the opener with Vern Stephens leading the way with a homer and two singles.

The Tigers nipped the Browns with two runs in the ninth. Doubles by George Kell and Vic Wertz produced the first run and Hoot Evers climaxed the rally with a bases loaded single.

Roy Campanella drove home five runs on a pair of homers to lead the Dodgers to victory over the Braves. Don Newcombe limited the Braves to eight hits including a home run by Sid Gordon to hang up his 16th conquest. (Continued on page 9)

MONTREAL, Aug. 12 (AP)—The United States Davis Cuppers completed their straight-set conquest of the North American zone today as Art Larsen and Budge Patty came off the bench to swat down a couple of earnest but outclassed Canadians.

Larsen gave some 2,500 fans at the Mount Royal club a sharp exhibition in trouncing Henri Rochon, another left-hander, 6-2, 6-1, 6-3. Patty, who also had sat out the first day's singles while Dick Savitt and Tony Trabert did the honors, did a similarly workmanlike job on youthful Lorne Main, 6-3, 6-3.

Thus the unwieldy collection of players captained by Frank Shields now has vanquished Japan, Mexico and Canada in fast succession without the loss of a set, much less a match.
