DALLAS—Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bolter, who are free-wheeling across the United States on bicycles at the rate of 60 miles-per-day, stopped in Dallas for a few hours Wednesday to visit with Mr. and Mrs. Tony Proal.

Recently of Chicago, the couple left Elroy, Wis., on June 7 on the present leg of their journey. They started their bicycle tour in New York City to Wisconsin via the New England states.

They paused for a leisurely 18 months in Chicago where he worked as a furniture upholsterer and she as a commercial photographer.

Mr. and Mrs. Bolter (both are 33) say the traffic is pretty heavy at present, so they plan to spend the next few weeks picking hops at Independence.

Their route to Dallas crossed Minnesota, the Black Hills and Badlands of South Dakota, Yellowstone National park, Idaho, Grand Coulee dam and Victoria, B. C.

They found the Washington coast too chilly, so traveled inland through Washington, going back to the Oregon coast at Astoria and coming down through Tillamook.

The pedaling couple plan to winter in San Francisco, then resume their tour into old Mexico and circle back through the southern states next year.
